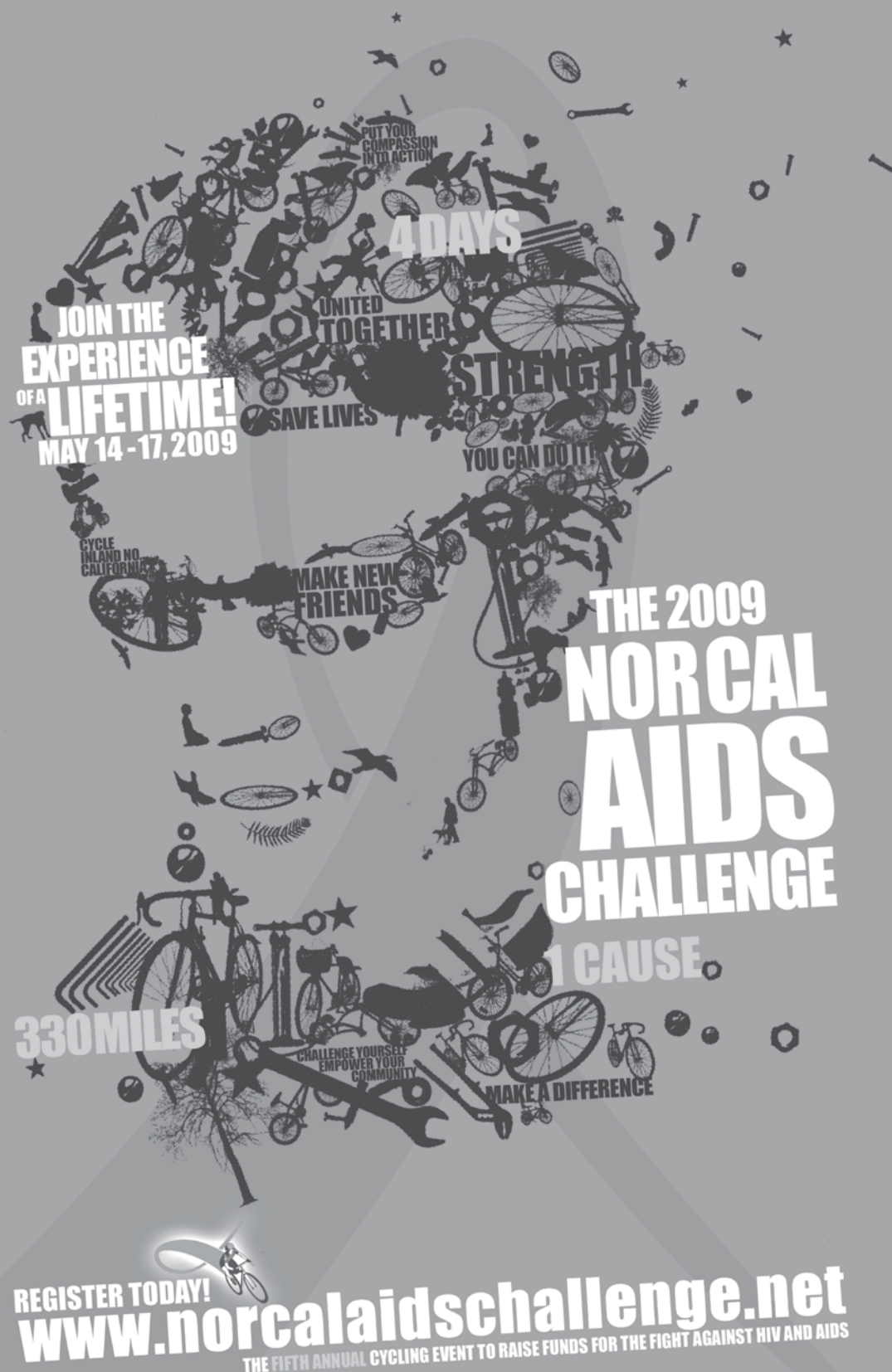

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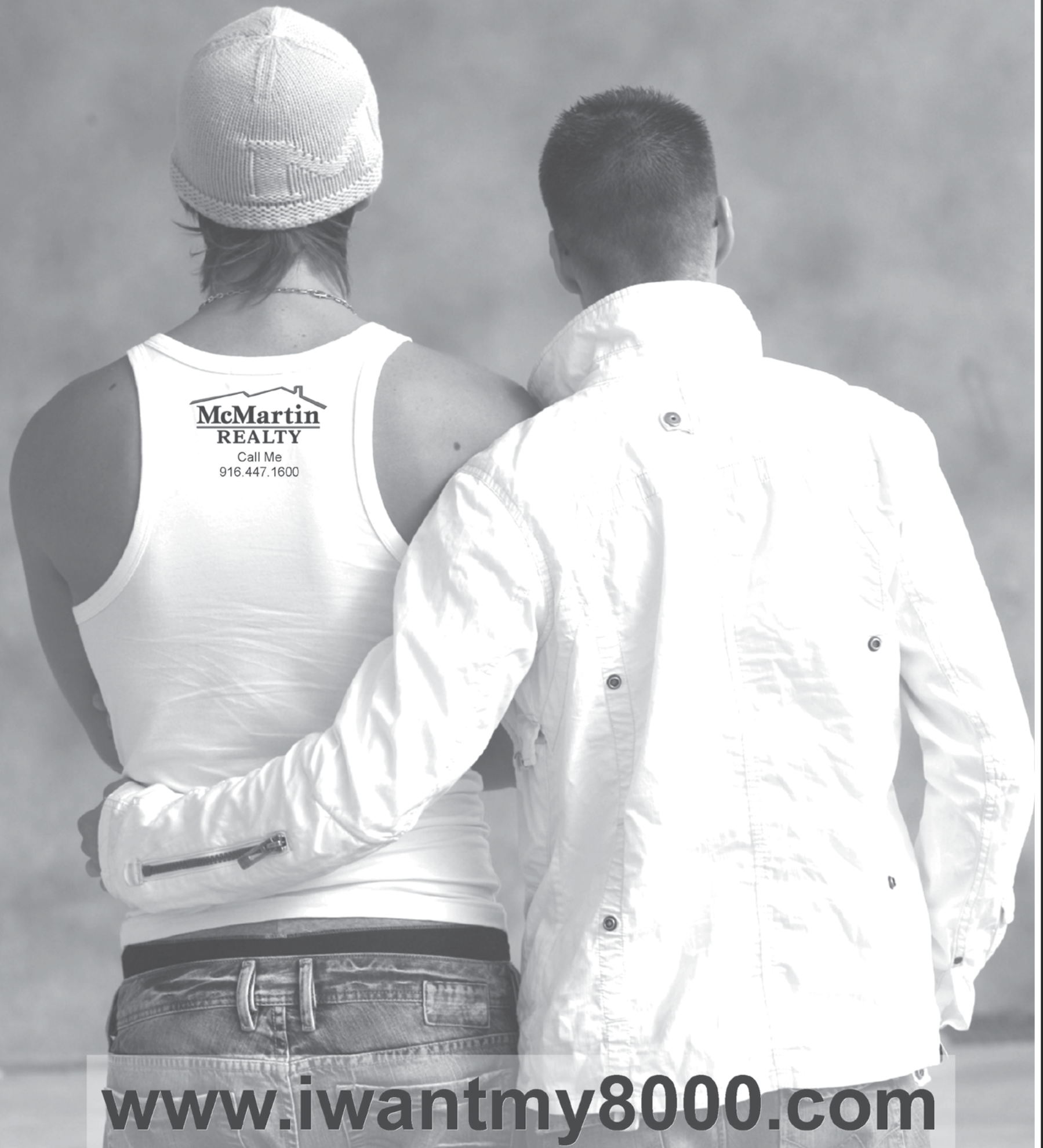
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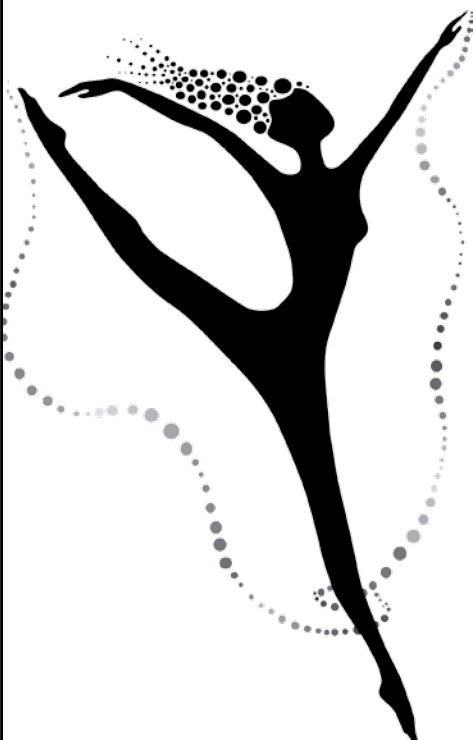

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Release Them

California has the opportunity to do the right thing. A three-judge panel has heard a case concerning the possible release of 52,000 state prisoners. Plaintiffs argue that the system provides inadequate medical and psychiatric care for its inmates. This is cruel and unusual, a violation of the Eighth Amendment, they say.

Taxpayers rightly resent the price tag of prison programs. But if the prisons cannot afford to care for their prisoners, we obviously have far too many.

Governor Schwarzenegger once vowed to reduce the prison population, and he ought to. Now is a good time to seriously reassess the whole system.

There were virtually no prisons in this country when it was founded. The modern criminal justice system grew out of the institution of slavery. Prisons exploded in their growth in the 20th century. The Progressive Era, whose leaders dreamed of re-creating society and redeeming mankind through an active and expansionist state, accelerated the development of today's system. It grew steadily.

Before Ronald Reagan's presidency, half a million Americans were in prison and jail, and fewer than 1.5 million on parole or probation. Now there are more than 2 million behind bars and 7 million total in the correctional system. In California, prison population grew by 500 percent from 1982 to 2000.

This is madness. And it's expensive. Some worry about the strain on social infrastructure if prisoners were mass-released, but they could not possibly cost the state more than they do now. They would also at least have the chance to

create wealth as workers and consumers in the market, rather than just being a drain in the public sector.

Each prisoner costs taxpayers \$35,000 per year. Victims are not made whole but instead are forced to foot the bill to house their perpetrators.

The state used to have some restitution centers through which white-collar convicts could work and pay back their victims as well as some of their detention costs, but these centers were closed down earlier this year. State officials said the program was too expensive. Only government could lose money making people work.

Most offenders never get the opportunity to pay restitution but are simply jammed into obscenely overcrowded cages. California's system is designed to hold about 100,000 prisoners but instead houses 171,000.

Judges used to have wide discretion in sentencing, which minimized overcrowding. In 1977, Democratic governor Jerry Brown stripped judges of this authority. "Over the next decade, California's legislature, dominated by Democrats, passed more than 1,000 laws increasing mandatory prison sentences," according to the Washington Post.

Brutal violence is all too common in prisons. Human Rights Watch estimates that nationwide, one out of 15 male inmates is raped. Many prisoners are effectively the slaves of their cellmates. Gang violence is endemic. The institution has become a totalitarian hell for those inside.

What's worse, most people incarcerated should not be. A quarter of the inmates are locked up for nonviolent drug offenses.

They committed no act of violence against anyone's person or property, and their imprisonment is part of a destructive drug policy that has increased crime, trashed civil liberties, uprooted the social order, and corrupted the whole legal system. Many others are in prison for other nonviolent offenses against the state — unapproved gun ownership, tax evasion, and so forth.

Many petty criminals do not deserve anything like today's prisons, and their incarceration helps no one. Most prisoners can and should be released. The number of those who actually must be isolated from society would not lead to overcrowding or be an ungainly financial burden.

California's recidivism rate is the highest in America. The system does not work. Indeed, offenders go in as smalltime thieves and come out far worse. They go in as drug users and come out desensitized to savage violence. They go in as burglars and come out as rapists. In short, prisons increase crime.

Conservatives talk about the good old days when there was more civility, more freedom, lower taxes, and less crime. There were also far fewer prisons. Until the modern system is rethought through a libertarian perspective, we can never restore the liberty and social peace we once had.



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Don't Sign That Initiative Petition!

Signature gatherers are now allowed to gather signatures on petitions to place a certain initiative on the ballot. At first glance, this initiative might seem like a good idea to LGBTI people. But it is a very dangerous petition. Please do not sign it!!!

The initiative would strip the concept of marriage from California law. Straight couples, who want to register their relationships with the state, would register as domestic partners rather than obtaining marriage licenses. Same sex couples would do the same.

On the surface that sounds like a good idea. It would place same sex couples and opposite sex couples on equal footing with regard to California law. But, actually it would be disastrous.

First of all, it would absolutely enrage conservative Christians. Many of them felt LGBT people were profaning something sacred when we tried to let same sex couples marry in California. Conservative Christians would view this new initiative as an attempt to totally destroy something that they consider sacred. They would go ballistic!

They would invest huge amounts of time, energy and money into defeating the new initiative. They spent over \$39 million on

proposition 8. That amount would probably pale in comparison to what they would spend to avert what they would view as the total destruction of the concept of marriage.

They would also be angry enough to want to get revenge. It is already likely that, if the State Supreme Court rules against us on Proposition 8, conservative Christians will seriously consider trying to overturn California's domestic partner laws. That would be a major new blow to the community. If this new initiative gets on to the ballot, it is almost certain they will try to overturn domestic partner laws.

There are other reasons for keeping this initiative off the ballot. There is no evidence to suggest there has been any change in voter sentiment since the voters approved Proposition 8. So far as I can tell, no one has yet proposed any comprehensive plan for achieving that change.

It would be foolish to mount another campaign, like this new initiative, without some clear evidence that the public's attitude has changed or that we have a credible plan for obtaining that change. Before trying again, we need to mount a well planned campaign that, at the very least, results in the beginning of a change in voter attitudes.

Then there is the issue of money. Our community spent over \$40 million in a losing effort to defeat Proposition 8. It would take that much, and probably more, to win passage of this new initiative. I doubt the community could raise the money needed so soon after the Proposition 8 campaign, and during these hard economic times. And, if we did raise it and lost, we would certainly be out of money and energy to fight off any new attack from the religious right.

So, what is a better plan?

1. First, we should wait to see how the Supreme Court rules on Proposition 8. If we win, no further action is needed.

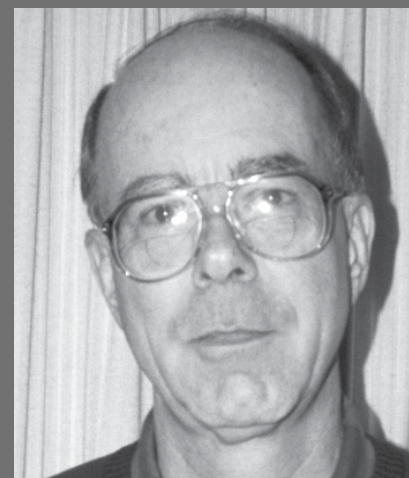
2. If we lose, we should create a well designed plan to change the attitudes of those who voted against us, particularly those in the African American and Latino and Latina communities.

3. We should do test runs, or at least focus groups, to see if the plan we designed actually works.

4. And finally, after doing these things, we might introduce a new initiative to amend California's constitution to allow same sex marriages.

The bottom line is, do not sign the initiative currently being distributed. That would lead to disaster.

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Family Leave For Same Sex Couples

AB 849 would expand the list of family members for whom an employee may take up to 12 weeks unpaid leave to care for a seriously ill family member. It would add the employee's domestic partner, among others, to the list.

This is an important bill for same sex couples. With the continuing HIV/AIDS epidemic the potential need to care for a sick domestic partner is an ever present reality. And AB 849 affects a lot of people. According to the Williams Institute, there are over 109,000 same sex couples in California. Over 50,000 such couples have registered as domestic partners.

The Williams Institute also reports that there are more than 861,000 lesbians, gays and bisexuals in the state. So there is the potential for many thousands of more couples who might be protected by AB 849, and who may need to make use of its protections.

The problem for such couples is that, if one falls sick or suffers a serious injury, the other person may need to take time off from work to care for his or her loved one, at least until other arrangements can be made. But someone who takes more than just a day or two to care for a loved one, faces the risk of losing his or her job. Then the family would be in serious economic trouble, especially in the current economy.

Current law requires employers to give married employees time off to care for a seriously ill spouse. AB 849 will require employers to allow employees, in registered domestic partnerships, up to 12 weeks

of unpaid leave to care for a seriously ill domestic partner. The employer must take the employee back after that time. The bill also adds other family members to the list of relatives an employee can take unpaid time off to care for.

California Communities United Institute will be helping people write to their legislators in support of this and other important legislation. LGBT Domestic Violence Bill

No one likes to talk about domestic violence in the LGBT community, but it does occur. According to the Gay Men's Domestic Violence Project, one in four gay men experience domestic violence. Reports from the California Department of Public Health indicate that they get reports of close to 3,000 cases of same sex domestic violence per year.

In 2006 an important bill to deal with this problem was signed by the Governor. The bill was AB 2051. This bill required the state to issue grants to up to four organizations that deal with domestic violence in the LGBTI community. The grants are to be used to fund services including, but not limited to, all of the following: (1) 24-hour crisis hotlines, (2) counseling, (3) court and social service advocacy, (4) legal assistance with temporary restraining orders, devices, and custody disputes, (5) community resource and referral, (6) household establishment

assistance, (7) emergency housing, and (8) educational workshops and publications.

The bill was a good start. But problems have occurred in its implementation. First of all, it appears to limit the state to providing grants to no more than four agencies. It would be nice to be able to fund more agencies than that, if the money is available. Second it appears that AB 2051 allows grants only to agencies that provide all of the above services. Many agencies are providing some of those services, and are doing valuable work. However, they are not equipped to be able to provide all of the listed services. It would be great to be able to provide funding support to these agencies as well.

AB 1003 has been introduced by Assembly Member John Perez this year. It deals with the above problems. It allows the state to provide grants to any number of agencies that deal with domestic violence in the LGBTI community. And it says that grants may be made to agencies that provide any of the above listed services. They do not have to provide the whole list of services to get a grant. It is good legislation.

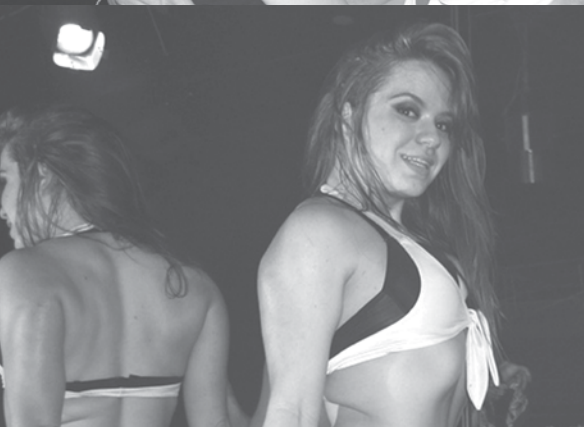


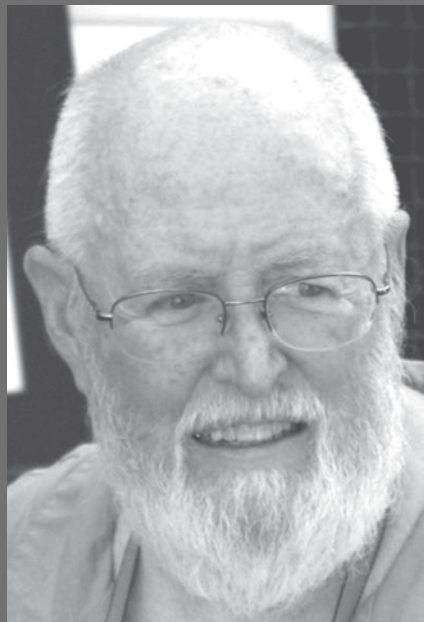

Hate Watch

On March 19, 2009 Fred Krager of Californian Against Hate amended the complaint he filed several week earlier with the California Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) asking it to investigate as to the fact the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints (LDS) based in Salt Lake City, Utah, failed to report direct and in kind contributions to the Yes on Prop 8 campaign as required by California law.

Research into LDS activities now shows the church started its opposition to same sex marriage in Hawaii with a series of letters written between 1995 to 1998 from a member of the Quorum of Seventy, Loren C. Dunn, to church president Gordon Hinckley and other church officials outlining how Dunn was sent to Hawaii to set up some kind of a front organization to oppose same sex marriage. These are things of which the No On 8 campaign should have been aware and used the Mormon activity in Hawaii and the other losing 26 state campaigns as a gage to judge the Mormon role against same sex marriage in California.

Also another heavy player that plopped 1.4 million into the Yes On 8 campaign was the Knights of Columbus, a Roman Catholic organization often regarded as a fraternal organization of Roman Catholic men whose main purpose is to help the poor. The Knights are described a "strong arm of the church."

For the large part the only thing most of us know about the Knights of Columbus is what we see in the ads they place in magazines and newspapers but in reality it is an organization which has 70 BILLION dollars of life insurance in force and in 2005 reported profits of 70 million dollars.

While it is a tax exempt nonprofit organization, under IRS and Federal court rulings nonprofits are

forbidden to spend "substantial" time and money engaged in non candidate political activities. These rulings have determined that 5 % of their time and money devoted to lobbying and other non-candidate political activities is not considered "substantial." So, the Knights of Columbus with a budget of 70 BILLION could have a LOT of money to throw around to defeat any campaign same sex marriage supporters might mount to overturn Prop 8 if the California Supreme Court does not. There is no reason to believe they will not do so as they have been involved in all 31 campaigns to defeat same sex marriage.

The people who are supporters of Prop 8 are not going to go away. They are in this thing for the long haul. They will use every dollar they can raise. They will tell every lie or twist any truth they can. They will form any alliance possible to defeat same sex marriage and when they are through with that they will go after domestic partnerships, despite some of their supporters claiming they have no problem with domestic partners as long as it isn't called marriage.

Given the failure on the part of the No On 8 campaign to do proper research, our so-called gay leaders should look very carefully into every aspect of what it would take to mount a ballot campaign to overturn Prop 8 and some of our new activist groups who are going willy-nilly trying to put things on the ballot should probably back off until they can ascertain if they have the resources to mount a creditable campaign.

Will it be enough to hire minority outreach workers? Will it be enough to reach out to "people of faith" in "moderate" denominations despite the fact church going is in a downward plunge here in California. Will we be prepared to answer the attacks that we are out to recruit children, an attack used against us since Anita Bryant days in the late

70s and one we have never adequately answered? Will they get money up front to mount a successful campaign and not wait until a campaign is under way to raise the bulk of the money needed?

Another thing that has bothered me is the failure of anybody in our community to address the question that when the legislature in 1977 changed our non-gender specific marriage laws it was done with animus. According to conversations I have had with former Assembly Member and former U. S. Representative Vic Fazio, one of the few members of the Assembly to vote against the change in the law, the members of the legislature knew the reason this amendment was put forth was to prevent same sex couples from getting married as some county recorders had for seven years been issuing marriage licenses to same sex couple based on the fact the marriage laws were non-gender specific.

Yet, former Governor Jerry Brown and our current Attorney General signed the amendment and basically set in motion the current battle.

I know we can not rewrite history, but what might have happened if Gov. Jerry Brown had the courage to veto the bill and send it back to the legislature with a strong message it should not discriminate against California's gay and lesbian citizens? Maybe it would have made some members think twice and vote against it if it was presented again.

If the members of the legislature knew they were voting to deny marriage to gay and lesbian citizens, surely Jerry Brown knew it too.

Now Jerry Brown wants to be governor again but before he gets any support from our community he owes us an apology for his actions in his previous administration.

Maybe he will do that when he speaks at the upcoming Stonewall 4 Freedoms Award dinner.

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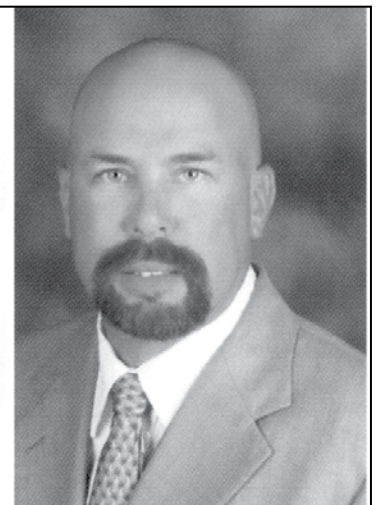
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Networking Coalition In Planning Stages

Representatives of regional LGBT organizations, local activists and community leaders in the greater Sacramento region have begun a series of meetings to form a regional networking coalition.

"After the passage of Prop 8, we realized that our organizations and activists didn't have a good way to communicate with each other," stated Paul Curtis, one of the conveners of these meetings along with Laurie McBride. "There were suddenly new groups springing up, and big gaps in communication among established groups."

The coalition wants to facilitate cooperation and communication on work for LGBT equality and the local, state and federal level. At its most recent meeting, half the time was spent on things like name, structure, and scope of activities (sharing calendars, building awareness and trust among groups, sharing resources).

The other half was devoted to Day of Decision activities (the Day that the California Supreme Court announces its Decision on upholding or repealing Prop 8). "We want everyone working together to make sure we're ready for whatever decision is handed down ... that we have activities in place to express our joy or our disappointment in a safe, responsible way," added Laurie McBride.

For D-Day (Day of Decision) Tina Reynolds, from Equality Action Now, and Bonnie Osborn, from the Gay & Lesbian Center, reported on how they are working together. Once the Supreme Court Decision is released at 10 a.m., activities like sign-making will be available at the Center.

Our community and allies will be encouraged to gather for an initial rally at the Center, followed by a march to the State Capitol, with another rally planned there for the West Steps. "If the decision goes our way, there will be music and general celebration," said Tina Reynolds. "If it does not, we will have speakers as well as an opportunity for people to discuss how they feel. Either way, it's important for our community to have a safe and focused outlet of expression," Reynolds added. The next meeting of the Coalition is set for Thurs., April 2 at the Gay & Lesbian Community Center at 6 p.m.

A child impacted by HIV will be guaranteed at least one more counseling session at Sunburst Projects.

A Breaking Barriers and CARES collaborative smoking cessation program for people with HIV/AIDS will receive additional funding.

Earmarked dollars for Harm Reduction Services (HRS) will offset salaries for outreach workers to help slow the spread of the virus among drug users.

And Capital City AIDS Fund's (CCAF) education campaign will be shored up to continue distributing free condoms in gay bars.

These services are able to continue due to the success of CCAF's annual Oscar Night® Sacramento event held Feb. 22 at the Sheraton Grand Ballroom. It's one of a few parties nationwide that is officially sanctioned by the Academy of Motion Pictures Arts and Sciences.

Despite widespread economic hardship, nearly 500 people generously opened their pocket books to purchase tickets and tables in support of the

HIV/AIDS community. "The turnout was amazing," said CCAF President Stuart Eldridge. "Ticket sales initially were a concern because of the recent downturn in the economy. But the fact that so many people showed up makes it clear that Sacramento cares about people in need of help and support."

Guests attending the glamorous event donned their finest attire and walked the red carpet as they entered the ballroom. Once inside, they were greeted by a silent auction that offered fine wines, original art work, Oscar® memorabilia and even tickets to the Ellen Show. Destination Sacramento

Vacation, what vacation? Unemployment in California rose to over 10.5% last month, the highest number in more than 25 years. Sacramento was just a little higher than the State average, at 10.7%. Local businesses are closing everywhere you look. We've been making International news for the last couple of weeks because there is a growing homeless population in "Tent City", Sacramento, Ca., U.S.A. If you do still have a job, it's likely that your income is lower, or you are at risk of being laid off. Maybe you are struggling to try and find work, keep your business open, keep your house, or even just buy groceries. If you are one of the lucky ones that is in a position to take a vacation though, where could you go that's better than here? I learned a new word in the last few months, maybe you've heard it. It's called "stay-cation", and it's becoming the latest trend.

I took a walk around the State Capitol a couple of weeks ago. There were a few Japanese tour buses parked out front. Everyone was posing for photos in front of the Capitol steps, making sure to get the dome in the background behind their smiling faces. It is an awesome place even if you live here, but I thought for a minute about how cool it must really be to attract visitors in droves from such far away places. They appeared to be so proud to have made it here. We may not notice it, but we are an International destination.

And there's good reason for that. Maybe I am partial because I am a California native, but I've always thought about California as being one of the coolest places in the world, and the coolest State in the Country. I am

proud of being an American in many ways (at least since we got rid of President Bush and vice President Dick). While we certainly have our problems, many of which I am ashamed of, I am proud of the fact that we are a Nation of immigrants seeking something better, where everyone is free, and where we have so many opportunities, that I think we do take for granted too often. Believe it or not, lots of people throughout the World still look up to us. Sure, there is plenty to complain about, but at least we can complain.

America being a beacon could be a whole other topic (and likely a debate), but when I think about California specifically, certain things randomly come to mind and melt together to form my idea of our California identity in a way, — sunshine, beaches, Hollywood, mountains, sports and entertainment, environmental protection, innovation and technology, universities, culture, and political activism (including gay rights). I think of our State as a leader, with so many attractions and sights to see. I think others do as well, and that's why they come here.

I grew up in Napa, and have never lived more than about 100 miles from San Francisco. The Wine Country didn't really have a gay community like a more urban area does, it's expensive, and there are less jobs that pay enough to afford the cost of living. San

Francisco and surrounding areas are just too expensive. The Central Valley doesn't really have a gay community, has economic and crime problems, not much to look at, and is lacking in the areas of entertainment and opportunity. The foothills are peaceful and very pretty, but there are not so many jobs, and once again, no real gay community to speak of. Sure there are gay people everywhere, but Sacramento has a gay community that rivals San Francisco, plus we have other things that make it a great place to live.

Our downtown gay area has developed into a pretty cool place to go hang out. "Lavender Heights" has become one of the hippest scenes in town. In fact, I'm not sure why our Mayor as a candidate said he was embarrassed of our downtown. I think downtown Sacramento is pretty nice. Oh yeah, he's homophobic so he probably didn't visit our neighborhood. Moving on though, we are also home to a professional sports franchise, Arco Arena, Cal Expo, an international airport, two major universities, four shopping malls, The Sacramento and American Rivers, and Folsom Lake, just to name a few. Sacramento is an employment center with many large employers; and has urban, suburban, and rural areas to live that are affordable compared to other areas of California. We have great weather, no hurricanes, no real humidity, no real cold weather or snow problems, way less rain than say Seattle, and way less heat than say Phoenix. So, back to taking a vacation. I have an idea. Pretend you didn't live hear or near here, and that you came to visit this area on a vacation, like so many others want to. What would you want to go see? Here's a list of places to go within driving distance, starting from the center:

1. "Lavender Heights" – Sacramento's downtown gay neighborhood, centered around the area of 20th St./ K St. - Clubs, dining, dancing, cocktails, shops, art, culture, and community centers. While you're there, pick up a free copy of Mom Guess What at one of the many outlets. Information can be found at:

4. Cal Expo – Home of the State Fair, horse racing, and many other events. More info can be found at:

5. Arco Arena – Home of the Sacramento Monarchs, the Sacramento Kings, and many concerts and other events. Go Monarchs! More info can be found at:

6. Folsom Lake/American River bike trails/Lake Natoma/Nimbus Dam/Sacramento State University Aquatic Center—The area between Folsom Lake and Downtown, along the American River and Highway 50 has so many great outdoor and aquatic activities, there is not enough room to list them all. The bike trail around the Folsom Lake Dam and the Rainbow Bridge is of my personal favorite local outdoor places. The scenery is absolutely gorgeous, and it's very accessible for those of us who are mostly city dwellers. Folsom Lake has 10,000 surface acres when full, and 75 miles of shoreline. There's a 32 mile bike trail along the American River, which runs between Folsom Lake and Downtown. You may also be interested in the boating, fishing, camping, sailing, kayaking,

or the fish hatchery. For more info::

Everything mentioned above is within about 30 minutes of downtown Sacramento, but wait, there's more. This is a top 10 list, and I've only listed 6 places so far. While many of you may be from the area and this is probably not news to you, at least it's possibly a reminder, and we may have some out of town readers. So, if you don't mind a little drive:

7. San Francisco! - Home of the Castro, the Golden Gate Bridge, the 49ers, Fisherman's Wharf, and the list goes on and on. If you're gay, you must go to the Castro and see everything. It's our historic place in the world. You can take the BART train from many areas along the way if you don't want to drive in the city traffic or are afraid to get lost (the train actually goes right under the bay in an underwater tunnel). You will be headed to the Market Street station, and it's pretty safe to ask anyone in the City how to get there. You can also get there by Ferry from Vallejo (about 30 miles north of SF), which is kind of fun all by itself, and only takes about 30 minutes. If you chose the Ferry, just drive west on the Tennessee St. exit in Vallejo all the way to the end, go left toward the main part of the marina, and go to the Ferry ticket booth.

For anyone who hasn't ever been to the City, you also can't go wrong with the Fisherman's Wharf area. At Fisherman's wharf you will find a multitude of street artists such as mimes, painters, cartoonists, and musicians (look out for the guy with the branch, you'll remember this and laugh if you see him). You can see the Golden Gate Bridge and Alcatraz right from there. You may want to take a short ferry ride for the Alcatraz tour, or go in the aquarium that hosts all kinds of creatures. Within about a 10 block stretch you will also find Ghirardelli Square (home of the best chocolate milkshakes ever), Pier 39 for shopping and watching and listening to the seals bark at each other, the beach, and oh yes, there is plenty of fresh sourdough, crab, and other seafood everywhere you look.

If you travel north over the Golden Gate Bridge, just on the other side, you will find the small city of Sausalito in Marin County. Sausalito is a little slower paced and less well known, but it has a neighborhood of house boats right on the water that have San Francisco and Alcatraz views. There are many shops and restaurants that are very, shall we say fashionable, but can be pricey. Marin County is a very well to do area. The residents there can be a little uppity, and are very environmentally conscience, so be careful not to litter or anything like that. More information can be found at:

8. Guerneville – The only regular small town I've ever been to where almost everyone is gay. Just continue driving north from the Golden Gate Bridge and Sausalito, along Highway 101, through Marin County, then on to Sonoma County. It's a pretty drive, if there's not too much traffic on Highway 101 (don't do this during traffic times). You'll have to follow the signs and turn west after you get through Santa Rosa, but will be traveling through some vineyards and fruit stand type areas, and it's kind of a country drive that turns into a forest at this point of the trip, so relax. About an hour north of San Francisco you will find this small little hippy town along the Russian River, that looks like a redwood forest. It's about 15 -20 miles from the Ocean as a bonus (Bodega Bay area). The town is only about 10 square blocks, but they have a few restaurants and shops, a post office, bank, video store, gas stations, real estate offices, grocery store, and a couple of bars. There are a few gay resorts for lodging. Most of the town really is gay. The others are all hippies that are so gay friendly I don't think they even notice anymore. You can rent vacation houses, bed and breakfast rooms, cottages, hotel type rooms, or even camp. Guerneville can be very rainy, and is known for flooding, so beware if you are traveling there in the winter. Once in a while the town is host to events and may be booked, but usually there is plenty of lodging otherwise. Because of the seasonal trends there, local gay lodging and other business owners really need our support to keep them in business. Owners try and fail often. More information can be found at:

9. Wine Country – My stomping ground. I won't go on and on about wine, because to tell you the truth, I don't know that much about wine or wineries. What I will say is that there are two areas that you can travel to from Guerneville on your way home that have so many wineries you wouldn't believe it. I can think of a couple big names like Sebastiani and Kentwood, but I'm really not the right person to ask about wineries.

The first area along the way is Sonoma County, and the other is the Napa Valley, which is a little more out of your way from Guerneville, but maybe even a little closer if you are traveling from Sacramento. From Guerneville, if you go through Santa Rosa to Highway 121 south toward Sonoma, you will see them all, large and small. The Sonoma wineries are a little less touristy, but I think there are more in the Napa Valley area (I counted 344 on the Napa Valley website with the link listed below).

There are also great small craft shops/stands, fruit and vegetable stands, and delicatessens along the way. If you are a NASCAR fan, Infineon Raceway is in the Sonoma County wine area. Continue through Sonoma toward Napa, and go north on Highway 29 to Yountville, St. Helena, and Calistoga, north of Napa, to visit the Napa Valley wine region (it's not really in the City of Napa). In Yountville, you can take off in a hot air balloon over the Valley if you plan ahead and are willing to get up really early.

It's beautiful on a clear day, and if you're

really lucky with the weather, you may even be able to see SF. Farther north in the Calistoga area, you can take a mud bath, go to hot springs, or get a message. There is also fine dining to be found everywhere, or stop at one of the many wine/bread/cheese type stores and picnic somewhere along the route. There are plenty of places. If you don't want to drive, there is a Wine Train that leaves the city of Napa and will take you through the Valley. It's a luxury train, and they serve food and of course wine on board. 10. Lake Tahoe – Last, but not least. Tahoe and Guerneville are the farthest on the list, but both are within about a 2 ½ hour drive. Stop in Placerville (a gold mining town in the foothills that is also known as Hang town) along the way if you want to take it slow. Lake Tahoe is a 39 trillion gallon lake that is about 1,600 ft. deep, located in the Sierras at an elevation of about 6,000 ft. I don't think I've ever seen a lake that was a more beautiful blue color than Lake Tahoe. There are many ski resorts and casinos around the lake. Be careful in the winter if it is snowing as you may need chains for your car to get there. Once there, you are within a short drive to Reno, Nevada, where there are even more casinos.

There is a woman's resort about 2 blocks from the lake that is very private named Holly's place. It's a friendly and cozy place to stay, with about 5 - 6 cabins on the 2 acre lot, surrounded by a fence of stacked firewood. You can rent a large house, or the cutest little romantic cabin you have ever seen. You can help yourself to the video library and watch movies next to a fire, or even borrow a couple of bicycles and take a ride to the lake.

Her employer denies health care coverage to gay couples, while providing coverage for couples falling under "common law" marriage, citing the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) which states:

No state (or other political subdivision within the United States) need treat a relationship between persons of the same sex as a marriage, even if the relationship is considered a marriage in another state.

The Federal Government may not treat same sex relationships as marriages for any purposes, even if concluded or recognized by one of the states.

This is really Bad News Bears for me. I've always been a bit of a thrill seeker and enjoy contact sports and athletic recreation. When I moved I assumed that with my charming nature and stellar employment history, I would quickly find work and be covered under my own health insurance plan once again (this was one of those afore mentioned enlightenment/disillusionment combos). As the weeks turned into months of applications turned in, followed by automatic generated notes of 'thank you for your interest in our company, if you match what we're currently looking for we will be in contact with you. Please don't respond to this email', my optimism began to waver, as the weight of the current economic crisis started to sink in. Fortunately, my partner and I can survive as a one income household, but the cost of medical coverage for one healthy adult is so outrageous I'm currently boycotting signing up for it. The days of tackle football, snowboarding, scuba diving, etc. will have to be put on the back burner for a while, at least until I find work or suck it up and pay the fees for health care

coverage.

On the Bright side, all this additional time with myself has taught me how to do a lot, while spending a little. I've completely kicked my Starbucks latte a day addiction, now grinding and brewing at home. I've found that the public library can be a place of refuge, and that books can offer glimpses into other time periods of suffering and beauty, to provide hope for a more brilliant tomorrow. The library also has an enormous selection of Independent and Foreign films, available at much cheaper prices than Blockbuster and Hollywood. I'm now emulating the penny pinchers of my childhood, one of whom (my dad) is relishing in the new position of advisor. I search through all the grocery ads on Tuesday for the best deals, and collect coupons in preparation for weekly shopping trips. It's a much more strategic affair now, no more compulsive, haphazard, throw whatever's clever in the cart approach. More and more meals are made at home, and the few times a month we do go out now seem more like an event, something to be enjoyed and appreciated, rather than just the next spot to grab a bite. Weekends are spent exploring local treasures now, and fortunately in San Pedro, there are many to be found. I've discovered the South Coast Botanical Gardens in Torrance, where acres of gardens are designed from templates all over the world. It's a truly serene place, perfect for a book, a snack, and a journal. The Royal Palms tide pools in San Pedro offer hours of fun, for free of course. There is tons of sea life to be found there, anemones, star fish, urchins, sea cucumbers, and many other beautiful life forms that I'm sure have names, I just don't know them. There are parks offering breathtaking views of Catalina Island, downtown LA and downtown Long Beach. There are daily whale watching cruises and trips to Catalina. I've found that a couple of hours on the coast have the power to diminish daily fears and insecurities, while reaffirming belief in God and in the masterful plan of creation.

Though I'm still looking for work, I now want to continue volunteering as a way to guarantee my happiness and sense of accomplishment and importance in life. Seeking meaning and purpose in life is a concept everyone is familiar with, especially during times of hardship and uncertainty. Now I know that those were hollow excuses, and that it really doesn't hurt to give. In fact, it is quite easy and incredibly rewarding. I've still got an hour's wait. An airport gift shop/newsstand is selling single pieces of fruit—the only living food on site—for a dollar seventy-five. The apples are so shiny even Snow White would be suspicious. I pass, but salivate a little anyway.

Eventually I board, find my aisle seat, and buckle in. Our flight attendant is very faggy. The straight men who work in this swishy profession always act extra macho to defy the stereotype, but this guy is a total queen. If feather boas were part of the allowable flight attendant uniform, he'd be flouncing one across his

shoulder while he reminds you to stow that bag completely under the seat in front of you, Mary.

Thank God(dess) another member of my tribe is onboard. If I can make contact he might slip me a packet of snack mix before takeoff. That would hold me until lunch. Then we get the bad news—no food. Airlines no longer offer in-flight meals. Who knew? On this seventeen-hundred mile flight they don't even serve pretzels. My belly gurgles disappointment.

We're told we can purchase a restaurant quality sandwich or salad for ten dollars. The nerve. I do not have an extra ten dollars to spend on what's supposed be included in the deal.

It's the principle of the thing. Airline meals are part of our culture. You can't change the rules. It's unnatural. It goes against tradition. 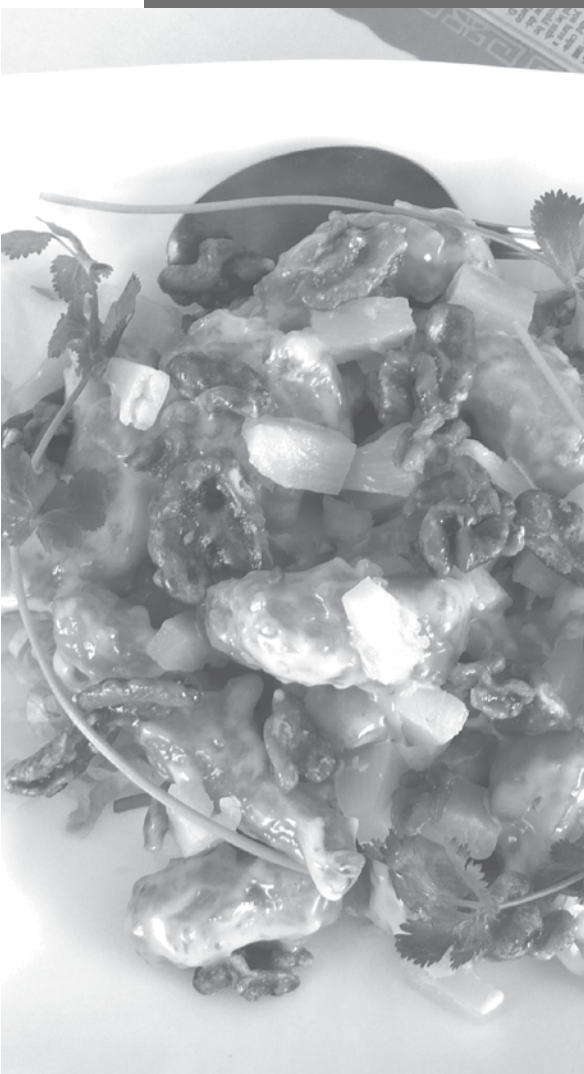

Wine Crawlin' On The Mexican Riviera

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Every few months my dear friend PJ, (who prefers to be called "Diva") and I meet for lunch in the Sacramento region. It's half way between her home in the foothills and my home in the San Joaquin Valley. Besides being centrally located, Sacramento has an abundance of great restaurants and a multitude of cuisines. Lunches take place in our favorite restaurants, the tried and true places that we depend on. Restaurants change fast in many aspects, quality, quantity, service, and life expectancy. Trying to please two very distinct and different palates presents problems, so when a place strikes our fancy, we frequent it often. For our last lunch I called and asked Diva if she would mind trying a new place in Sacramento called Sarus. "What is a Sarus?" was her response. I told her it was a new restaurant in midtown specializing in Vietnamese and Chinese cuisine. The Diva agreed and with her approval that's where we dined.

Tria, who also was our server, warmly greeted us at the door. Both Diva and I noticed right away that the restaurant was very clean and welcoming. We asked to be sat near the window so we could people watch and assume our normal roles of "fashion police" since we both work in Law Enforcement (we give imaginary citations to many).

Tria brought menus to our table and took our drink order. The restaurant currently only has a beer and wine license, but they also offer soft drinks, fresh lemonade, Vietnamese Iced Coffees, Teas of many flavors, and many unique milk shakes. I ordered a cold soda and Diva ordered the restaurants iced tea. Throughout our entire meal I had to hear how delicious the house iced tea was and poor Tria graciously refilled Diva's glass 5-6 times. You would have thought she was a Camel with as much as she was drinking, but she could not get over the unique and tasty flavor of the tea. If you're into tea, you should try it based on her mass consumption. My soda was perfect by the way.

We felt a bit awkward ordering Vietnamese; only as we both soon learned neither of us had ever had Vietnamese food. Tria persuaded us to try a Vietnamese appetizer called Nem Nuong. When the appetizer was presented both Diva and I commented on how beautiful it was. Tria brought several dipping sauces to the table and explained each one. Nem Nuong is an appetizer of fresh vegetables including carrots, cucumber, lettuce, mint, cilantro, and grilled pork rolled in a rice wrap. It was Delicious with a capital "D"! Sarus had me at first bite!

For our entrees each of us ordered

something different. I ordered the Mandarin Chicken, which was white chicken meat delicately, battered and fried. It has a spicy sauce on it, but not overly sauced. Diva ordered Honey Walnut Shrimp. Words fail me on this dish. It was perfect. Huge shrimp battered and fried in a light sauce with toasted honey covered walnuts and slices of pineapple. Both dishes came with an order of rice. The need for any sauces of any kind did not exist, however the table did have several if you are so inclined. The dishes are perfect as they are presented.

Upon arrival of both dishes Diva commented, "Oh look at the plates of beautiful food". She was right; the presentation of each item was lovely.

Midway through our meal, Dawn Nhan the owner of the establishment came over to check on us. I am sure she could hear the moans from our table and my snapping pictures of the food caused attention. She asked if we would be interested in trying an authentic Vietnamese dish called Bun Tom Thit Nuong Cha Gio. We didn't have to think and just nodded "yes". The aroma of the dish arrived prior to the dish being sat down at the table. It was a stunning dish and Dawn says the most popular on her menu. I can only describe it as a tossed Vietnamese salad that arrives untossed for presentation. The large bowl has sections of grilled shrimp, grilled pork, salad, browned garlic, and scallions, resting on a bed of rice noodles. It arrives with several sauces so that you can create a "salad dressing" of sorts to pour over and then mix. The dish was outstanding. I know

why it is a favorite among those that have tried it. So that you don't have to scare the server with your mispronunciation, just order # 14, you won't be disappointed.

Dawn checked on us several times throughout our meal and was so happy to see us enjoying her food. She has worked with the chefs and taught them her family's recipes. The entire operation is run with family and friends, which is reflected in the dishes and service we received.

Sharing ones passion is a great gift for both the giver and the receiver and Dawn enjoys her newfound friends (customers) and loves for them to experience the food of her heritage. I asked how she would describe Vietnamese food to those that had not experienced it, she simply stated that it is clean, fresh, not oily and from the heart.

As we left, Diva thanked both Tria and Dawn and stated we would be back. She is right; it's now on the list as a "tried and true" lunch spot.

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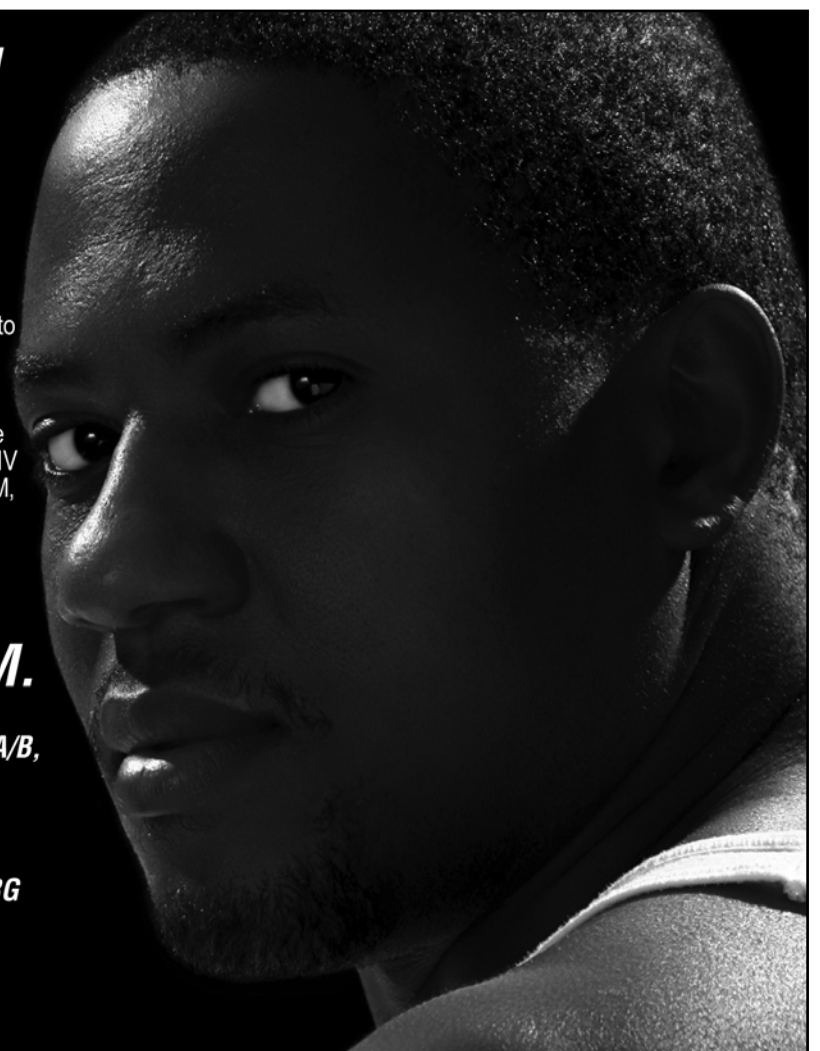

I am happy to announce a new cast member who has had the crowd in awe every Sunday night. "Miss Mahlae, who is a 21-year-old young Spring Chicken who brings a lot of energy to the stage.

Last month I took a trip to my parents house after two months and stayed for a four day vacation. I swear, every time I go to my parents house I gain ten pounds! The first day I arrived, my mother asked me if I wanted to go to Sizzler. I cannot turn down food! So up I went and gorged on a steak and shrimp platter. The next day we went to a Chinese buffet and the day after a regular restaurant.

My mother and I watched a lot of movies including *Milk* with Sean Penn and wow, was it a great movie! I couldn't believe that my mother knew so much about Harvey Milk and the man that killed him, Dan White. My mother is 73 years of age and has seen it all. I also watched *The Boy With The Striped Pajamas* which led me to tears, especially at the end when the little boy got killed accidentally in the gas chambers from the Nazis. I give them the strength and the courage to be who they want to be and love them as they should be loved.

Just like in every family there are good kids and bad kids. Some kids have stolen from me and done hateful things behind my back. But I still enjoy being a drag mother and grandmother. I am extremely proud of my gay family!

When I got to Bakersfield, I spent the whole day shopping—and of course eating—and watching drag pageants.

The next day we prepared for my daughter's drag show who hosts "The Moore Show" at the Element Lounge. I was stunned to find she had arranged a special show in my honor. I performed a Tina Turner medley and a Celine Dion song and the crowd just ate me up. I had a fabulous time that night.

Well the night wasn't over yet—after the show about 30 people from the club came back to the house for an after-hours party till about 5 a.m. Wow, those Bakersfield people can party! The next morning it was a four hour drive back to Sacramento for the Sunday night show.

Tired or not, I love my audience and the show must go on! After a good night of rest it was back to FACES Rupaul's Drag Race which I host on Monday Nights at 9 p.m. I have been resting ever since.

This week I came home I noticed a small puddle of water on my livingroom floor, my

Swanner: Ever since I saw the preview, I've been wanting to see *I Love You, Man* which is the new Paul Rudd movie — it was very funny and about a man (Rudd) who has just become engaged and overhears his fiancé and her friends talking about how he has no male friends and that means no best man. We all do it. My experiences with Johnny Angel, personal trainer (little sparkle glinting off his perfect white

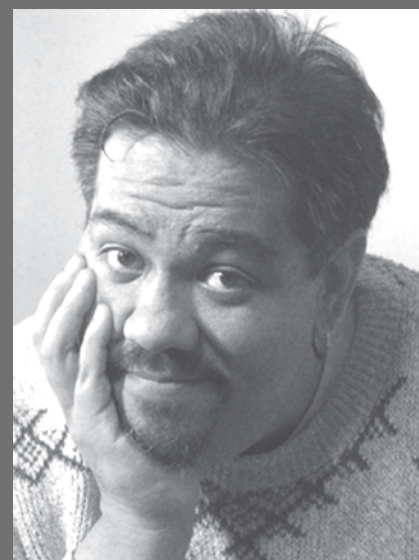

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FED'S MEDICINAL POT POLICY IS SHIFTING...

New top cop Attorney General Eric Holder has indicated a change in policy on medical marijuana, with Drug Enforcement Administration emphasis now to be on those who violate state law, as well as federal law. Although he was not specific about who would, or would not face DEA raids, he did say that cases in which medicinal pot dispensaries were believed to be adhering to California law were not a priority of the new Obama administration.

OBAMA NEEDLE EXCHANGE POLICY MAY SHIFT AS WELL...

The Obama administration is also in support of federally funded needle-exchange programs as part of a drug policy shift from prohibition and punishment toward boosting public health, says the assistant Secretary of State. "This will result in a policy that is broader and stronger than the one we had in the past," he said.

VATICAN DEFENDS POPE'S OUTDATED STANCE ON CONDOM USE...

Pope Benedict XVI's recent statement that condoms "increase the problem" of AIDS has come under fire from European governments as well as public health experts. He made the declaration on his way to Africa, which is devastated by the epidemic and in desperate need of accurate guidance.

The Catholic Church teaches that fidelity and abstinence are the best ways to control HIV/AIDS, and that condoms can lead to risky sexual behavior. Additionally, the Church rejects the use of condoms as part of its overall teaching against artificial contraception. A Vatican spokesperson said the pope is "maintaining the position of his predecessors."

Health and development ministers throughout Europe responded quickly, noting that condoms play a decisive role in stemming the HIV/AIDS epidemic, and that the pope's statements were a "dangerous doctrinaire vision."

The professor of immunology at Britain's Oxford University added, "My reaction is that this represents a major step backwards in terms of global health education, is entirely counter-productive, and is likely to lead to increases in HIV infection in Africa and elsewhere."

SOURCES OF SEX-ED CAN IMPACT

BEHAVIOR...

A study recently published in the American Journal of Health Behavior indicates that sources of sexual information in young people are associated with their later behavior and control beliefs. The study of 459 youths indicated that learning about sex from parents, grandparents, and religious leaders was associated with beliefs likely to postpone sex. Learning from friends, cousins, and media was associated with beliefs that increased the likelihood of having earlier sexual intercourse.

BIG BROTHER COMES TO ORANGE COUNTY...

Orange County's current Board of Supervisors has done an about-face on the county's decision 40 years ago to allow Planned Parenthood to operate a clinic at the county hospital, and provide comprehensive sex education at schools and after-school programs. Last week, the board voted unanimously to suspend Planned Parenthood's \$300,000 grant because they believe the group might include actual abortions among their services. In fact, however, none of the grant is used to provide abortions, a fact well-documented for the county, say Planned Parenthood officials.

"The irony is that the money... is educational so that women won't get themselves in a situation where they need an abortion," said the medical director of another of the community's 18 clinics. He also said that he had been contacted twice by the board, asking if he offered abortions or abortion referrals. Other clinics were similarly contacted and questioned. He explained to the board that the clinics do not offer abortions, but only information and counseling on a full range of reproductive options, including legal abortions.

"What I talk about with my patients is private," he said. "That I have a contract manager asking about those conversations is something that makes me very uncomfortable," he said.

One supervisor says they're now considering turning the education program over to Birth Choice Health Clinics, an abstinence-based group that describes itself as a pro-life ministry and uses ultra-sound photos and biblical material to "counsel" women.

FINDING THE INVISIBLE MAN...

Cultural training for those serving African American men who have sex with men will be held on Fri Apr 24, 9:00-3:30, at the county's Adult Services conference

room on Broadway. The free training (with 5 continuing education credits) will give an overview of some of the knowledge and tools needed to provide culturally appropriate HIV interventions to Black Americans. SIN IN SACRAMENTO GROWING...

Seventeen local folks attended the first potluck-social organized by Strength In Numbers - Sacramento, held last month at the Gay & Lesbian Center on L Street. The trip will be on the south fork of the American River, and the \$60 fee covers everything – tents, rafting equipment, meals, etc. Some financial scholarships are also available – no one is turned away because of financial concerns, says Healing Waters (see www.hwaters.com). FEDERAL HIV FUNDS ON WAY TO CALIFORNIA...

The federal Department of Health & Human Services is awarding a grant of \$870,775 to the Sacramento County Dept of Health & Human Services. Sacramento is home to an estimated 5,000 people with HIV or AIDS, and the money will be used to help folks without health insurance who are in financial difficulty due to the recession. "This grant helps those who need it most, and shows our commitment to helping those living with HIV and AIDS," said Rep. Doris Matsui (D-Calif.).

BETTER DRUGS LEADING TO COMPLACENCY...

After years of educational efforts to change the perception of AIDS from an always-fatal disease to a manageable long-term condition, some experts in France suggest that the huge variety of available treatment options now means that some people, in France and in other western countries, have become complacent. Ironically, they "see HIV

and AIDS as a chronic disease -- not as one that can kill," says Francoise Barre-Sinoussi, a 2008 winner of the Nobel Prize for Medicine.

That false sense of security has led in part to the "frightening" rate of new HIV infections among men who have sex with men in Western nations, he says. People should bear in mind that long-term survivors of HIV are also prone to other illnesses, particularly cancers. In addition, they can become resistant to the anti-retroviral drugs, causing "major complications."

In the 1980s, says the head of Montreal's university AIDS Center, gay community leaders mounted grassroots HIV/AIDS prevention campaigns, and infections fell dramatically for a decade. But with advances in treatment, "the voices that spoke for safe sex are often silent." And the drugs themselves can be toxic.

"The data from our studies indicate the average age of people now getting HIV or AIDS is 35. These are mature individuals, not kids," he said. "Some people are throwing caution to the wind."

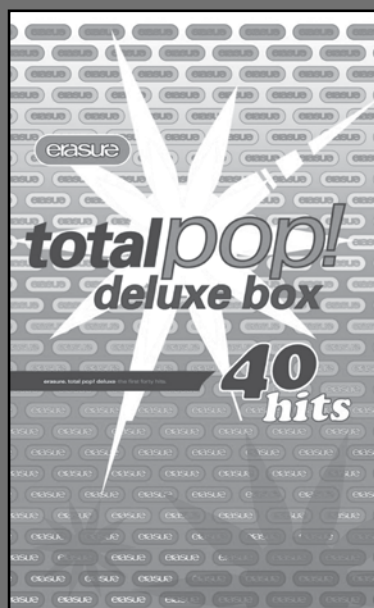

Erasure's world-conquering anthems of love, lust and longing have made it one of the most beloved and enduring success stories in modern British pop music history. After more than two decades, Andy Bell and Vince Clarke (founding member of Depeche Mode and Yaz) have sold more than 15 million albums around the globe, proving themselves masters of every kind of song from disco symphonies to unplugged ballads.

Rhino shows 'a little respect' to the group with a four-disc boxed set (3CD/DVD) that includes all of the band's singles (remastered in 2009) on two discs, a career-spanning collection of live performances on a third CD and a DVD of the group's best BBC appearances. **TOTAL POP! - DELUXE BOX** will be available April 7 from Rhino Records at all retail outlets, including www.rhino.com, for a suggested list price of \$54.98.

The first disc contains a newly remastered version of *Pop!—The First 20 Hits*, Erasure's 1992 singles compilation and the group's fourth consecutive #1 album in the U.K. Arranged chronologically, the disc encompasses all of the group's singles, from its 1986 debut *Wonderland* to the 1992 EP, *Abba-esque*. 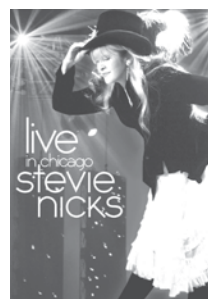
The second disc picks up where the first left off, offering 19 singles released from 1994 to 2007, the year of the band's most recent studio album, *Light At The End Of The World*. Stevie Nicks, rock's superstar chanteuse, the "Gold Dust Woman" herself, will be releasing the "Live In Chicago" DVD as well as "The Soundstage Sessions" CD - both in stores on March 31st, it was announced

today by Reprise Records.

The "Live in Chicago" DVD includes all the timeless Nicks songs from her solo projects as well as songs written as a member of the legendary rockers Fleetwood Mac. Along with Stevie classics such as "Stand Back," "Rhiannon," "Dreams," "Gold Dust Woman," "Landslide" and "Edge of Seventeen," the DVD also features stunning cover songs, including Dave Matthews' "Crash Into Me" and a tear-down-the-house finale of Led Zeppelin's "Rock and Roll."

"This is the first time since 1985 that I have had one of my live shows filmed and recorded," said Nicks. "We spent three years perfecting this show which we began in Vegas in October of 2007. "We wanted everything on the DVD and CD to look and sound perfect and I think we succeeded," concluded Nicks.

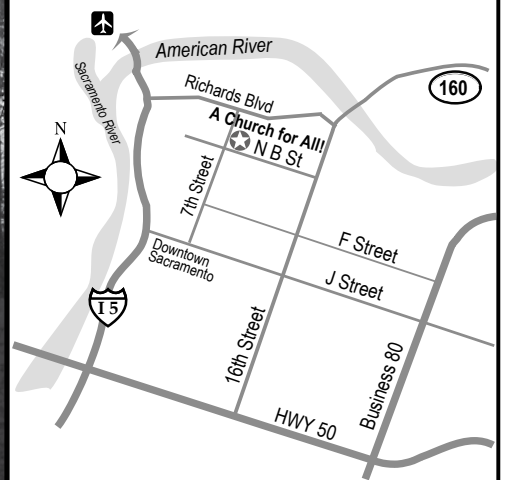
I am a Painting Contractor. The name of the last client I worked for had the same first and middle name as my Dad. During this job my father who lives in NJ was rushed to the hospital to have surgery.

It is these moments that make it all worth it. We recognize our connection to the Source as magic. We see miracles all around us, no matter how small. God is not just in the good, but in everything. Chaos and suffering are transformative and our fear of the future is only fear. We are all warriors with a mission to remember the truth.

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Some say that polar bears are going to disappear in 50 years, but Alaskan officials insist their populations are recovering. What's the real story?

There is no doubt that polar bears are in serious trouble. Already on the ropes due to other human threats, their numbers are falling faster than ever as a result of retreating ice due to global warming. The nonprofit International Union for the Conservation of Nature, which added the polar bear to its "Red List" of the world's most imperiled wildlife back in 2006, predicts a 30 percent decline in population for the great white rulers of the Arctic within three generations (about 45 years).

The nonprofit Center for Biological Diversity presents an even more pessimistic forecast. If current warming trends continue, they say, two-thirds of all polar bears—including all of Alaska's polar bears—will be extinct by 2050. Both organizations agree that the species as a whole will likely be wiped out completely within 100 years unless humans can get global warming in check.

The erroneous notion that Alaska wildlife officials don't believe the polar bear is in trouble was put forth by Alaska governor Sarah Palin when she initiated a suit against the federal government in hopes of overturning its decision to include the polar bear under the umbrella of endangered species protection. "I strongly believe that adding them to the list is the wrong move at this time," Palin wrote in a January 2008 New York Times Op Ed piece. "My decision is based on a comprehensive review by state wildlife officials of scientific information from a broad range of climate, ice and polar bear experts."

The real story is that affording the polar bear endangered species protection would bring further regulations capping greenhouse gas emissions, a threat to Alaska's main economic driver: oil revenues. Alaska professor Rick Steiner uncovered the misinformation in Palin's claims when he found evidence that the state's top wildlife officials agreed with federal findings that polar bears are headed toward extinction: "So, here you have the state's marine mammal experts, three or four of them, very reputable scientists, agreeing with the federal proposed rule to list polar bears and with the USGS [United States Geological Survey] studies showing that polar bears are in serious trouble," said Steiner.

A solid link between global warming and polar bear mortality emerged in 2004 when researchers were surprised to find four drowned bears in the Beaufort Sea off Alaska's North Slope. The meltdown of sea ice—the polar ice cap had retreated a record 160 miles to the north—forced the bears to swim unusually long distances to find solid ice, which they depend on as hunting and fishing platforms and for rest and recuperation. And more recently, USGS researcher Steven Amstrup published findings that polar bears are "stalking, killing and eating other polar bears" as competition

for scarcer food heats up.

Beyond global warming, other risks to polar bear populations include toxic contaminants in the surrounding environment as well as in the fatty tissue of the prey they rely on, conflicts with shipping, stresses from recreational polar-bear watching, oil and gas exploration and development, and overharvesting through legal and illegal hunting.

There's a lot of talk today about solar and wind power, but what about biomass? How big a role might this renewable energy source play in our future? Couldn't everyday people burn their own lawn and leaf clippings to generate power?

The oldest and most prevalent source of renewable energy known to man, biomass is already a mainstay of energy production in the United States and elsewhere. Since such a wide variety of biomass resources is available—from trees and grasses to forestry, agricultural and urban wastes—biomass promises to play a continuing role in providing power and heat for millions of people around the world.

According to the non-profit Union of Concerned Scientists (UCS), biomass is not only a renewable energy source but a carbon neutral one as well, because the energy it contains comes from the sun. When plant matter is burned, it releases the sun's energy originally captured through photosynthesis. "In this way, biomass functions as a sort of natural battery for storing solar energy," reports UCS. As long as biomass is produced sustainably—with only as much grown as is used—the "battery" lasts indefinitely.

While biomass is most commonly used, especially in developing countries, as a source of heat so families can stay warm and cook meals, it can also be utilized as a source of electricity. Steam captured from huge biomass processing facilities is used to turn turbines to generate electricity. Of course, biomass is also a "feedstock" for several increasingly popular carbon-neutral fuels, including ethanol and biodiesel.

According to the federal Energy Information Administration, biomass has been the leading U.S. non-hydroelectric renewable energy source for several years running through 2007, accounting for between 0.5 and 0.9 percent of the nation's total electricity supply. In 2008—although the numbers aren't all in yet—wind power likely took over first place due to extensive development of wind farms across the country.

According to the USA Biomass Power Producers Alliance, generating power from biomass helps Americans avoid some 11 million tons of carbon dioxide emissions that burning the equivalent amount of fossil fuels would create each year. It also helps avoid annual emissions of some two million



tons of methane—which is 20-plus times stronger a "greenhouse" gas than carbon dioxide—per year.

The largest biomass power plant in the country is South Bay, Florida's New Hope Power Partnership. The 140 megawatt facility generates electricity by burning sugar cane fiber (bagasse) and recycled urban wood, powering some 60,000 homes as well as the company's own extensive milling and refining operations. Besides preserving precious landfill space by recycling sugar cane and wood waste, the facility's electricity output obviates the need for about a million barrels of oil per year.

Some homeowners are making their own heat via biomass-fed backyard boiler systems, which burn yard waste and other debris, or sometimes prefabricated pellets, channeling the heat indoors to keep occupants warm. Such systems may save homeowners money, but they also generate a lot of local pollution. So, really, the way to get the most out of biomass is to encourage local utilities to use it—perhaps even from yard waste put out on the curb every week for pick-up—and sell it back to us as electricity.

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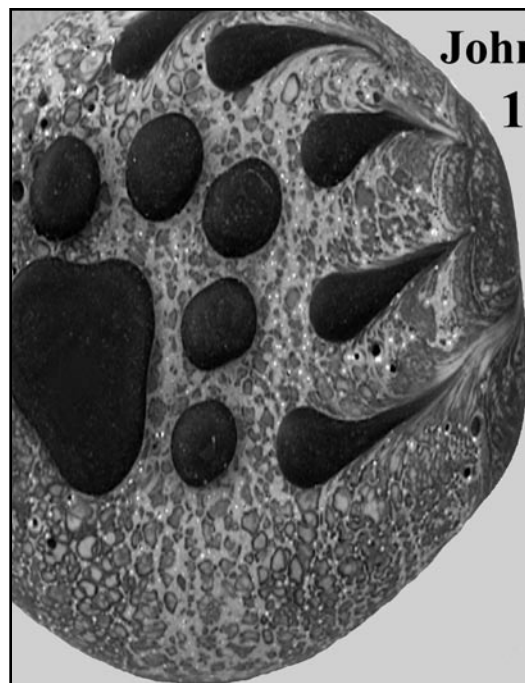
