LAVENDER LIBRARY HISTORY DISPLAY WILL EXHIBIT IN SACRAMENTO LIBRARY

In celebration of Pride Month, June 2009, the Lavender Library, Archives and Cultural Exchange of Sacramento, Inc., is collaborating with the Sacramento Public Library by installing a gay and lesbian exhibit at the Central Library, 828 I Street, in downtown Sacramento.

One portion of the exhibit is devoted to a

Gay and Lesbian Timeline, listing important people and events in gay and lesbian history with emphasis on the United States, California and Sacramento.

Another part of the exhibit comprises materials from two of Lavender Library's archival collections, the Cherie Gordon Collection and the Michael R. Gorman Collection. Materials from both of these collections touch on the issue of discrimination of gays and lesbians in American society.

Other materials included in the exhibit are games, Billy dolls, a button display, photographs, and other memorabilia.

In addition to the exhibit, two speakers are scheduled to speak at the East Meeting Room at the Central Library. On June 10 at 6 p.m., local attorney M. Jane Pearce will discuss legal issues involving gay marriage, domestic partnership, wills and trusts for same sex couples, and the impact of Proposition 8. In this entertaining session the author will fill in the gaps of little known gay California writers and artists throughout history.

The last scheduled event at the same location and to be held on June 24 at 5:30 p.m., will be the screening of the award winning film "Milk" about openly gay San Francisco supervisor Harvey Milk.

Time to Tax Sacramento with Tough Love

In Sacramento, it seems the issue of the day is always the need for more tax revenue. Unlike Oliver Twist, however, the legislators demand more taxes; they do not ask for more taxes, and they never say please.

The antithesis of Oliver Twist, Sacramento is the embodiment of a looting "Robbing Hood." Sacramento takes from the taxpayers and gives to the tax moochers, and has the effrontery to continue this looting by demanding that taxpayers vote yes on the coffer-filling Propositions 1A through 1E.

These five propositions on California's upcoming May 19 special election ballot are designed to save Sacramento from a fate worse than death - no money in the coffers to redistribute to moochers politically disguised as "those in need."

The recently approved budget to close the \$41 billion deficit now has an \$8 billion "tax shortfall." If three of the special initiatives fail, there will be another \$6 billion in "lost revenue." That's a \$14 billion hole in the shoe without a shoe repair shop in sight.

This month, Sacramento expects to raid paychecks of \$8.9 billion in personal income taxes. That's \$8.9 billion taxpayers could spend more wisely as a personal economic stimulus.

It's time for tough love lessons on taxes for Sacramento. Just vote no on Propositions 1A through 1E. (Vote yes on Prop. 1F, which denies pay increases to legislators during budget deficit years, although it's just a bone thrown to the "taxpayer dogs.") How can California repair the \$14 billion

hole in the shoe?

The state employs 345,000 people who average \$85,000 in annual pay and benefits. In comparison, private industry per capita pay and benefits averages \$45,000. If state employees' pay and benefits were scaled to average that of private industry, the \$40,000 reduction per state employee would repair the \$14 billion hole in the shoe.

Another cost-saving measure would be to index the state private industry unemployment percentage rate and state worker furloughs. Whenever the private industry unemployment level exceeds 3 percent, which is about a half-million workers, an automatic furlough would kick in at all state agencies for each full percentage point above 3 percent. Why? Fewer private industry workers means lower income tax revenues, which mean less money to keep paying government workers.

The state budget could be further cut by reviewing each state department, division, bureau, board, and commission. The review would determine whether the taxpayerfunded government service should be discontinued, merged with other departments, or charge user fees to cover its budget, or whether the service should be competitively bid out at less cost to taxpayers

Here are some other ways California could help taxpayers, especially those in lower income brackets:

Repeal minimum wage laws to reduce overall unemployment and to promote employment of low-wage workers, unskilled workers, visa immigrants, and those with limited education or job experience. Repeal prevailing wage laws to increase the number of workers hired on state construction bond projects and enact market-competitive hiring under right-to-work laws.

Benefit unemployed and low-wage

According to a recent study from the Cali¬fornia Department of Corrections and Re¬habilitation, 67 percent of LGBT inmates report being sexually assaulted by another inmate, a rate 15 times higher than the overall prison population.

By amending the Sexual Abuse in Detention Elimination Act (SADEA) of 2005 to include sexual orientation and gender identity on the list of factors for consideration when classifying and housing prisoners, the legislation promotes safety for and prevents assault against LGBT people in the prison system. The list of factors currently includes age, gender, type of offense, and prior time served.

"All people deserve basic protections including those serving time in our state prisons," Assemblymember Ammiano said upon introducing the bill. "No prisoner should fear for his or her life or be the target of abuse because of his or her sexual orientation or gender identity.

The bill developed following a Senate Public Safety Committee meeting held in San Francisco this past December and chaired by Senator and former Majority Leader Gloria Romero (D-Los Angeles). The meeting, which was

worker families by exempting all food, drink, beverage, and clothing purchases in a single transaction of \$500 or less from city and state sales taxes.

Exempt those ages 72 and over, and all fully disabled, and their life-partners, from paying income taxes or property taxes. Seniors and disabled who rent would receive property tax rebates.

Exempt K-12 teachers from state income taxes on their teaching income and property taxes on their home. Teachers who rent would receive property tax rebates. The massive \$50 billion public school employment budget would be reduced as teachers would need less pay because they would keep what they earn.

Exempt home schooling parents from paying education property taxes, since they shouldn't have to pay to send someone else's children to government schools. Exempt home schooling parents from paying state income taxes on the amount of time spent on home schooling and the cost of materials against their earned income. Home schooling parents who rent would receive an education property tax rebate.

These few tax relief fixes are limited in scope against the ultimate fix of repealing all taxes and starting fresh. To paraphrase Marc Anthony in Shakespeare's Julius Caesar, "Cry 'Havoc' and let loose the 'taxpayer dogs' of war on taxes."

Finally, the taxpayers of California must send a livid message to the larcenous legislators of Sacramento and vote no on Props. 1A through 1E, in essence telling them, "Enough already!" Then taxpayers should vote yes on Proposition 1F, which denies pay increases to legislators during budget deficit years.

LGBT Prisoner Safety Act Passes Assembly with Bipartisan Support

The California State Assembly passed the LGBT Prisoner Safety Act, AB 382, today by an overwhelming margin of 64-9. The bill garnered significant bipartisan support. Sponsored by Equality California (EQCA) and introduced by Assemblymember Tom Amniano (D Assemblymember Tom Ammiano (D San Francisco), the bill is designed to prevent violence against lesbian gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) people in the state prison system. The bill received more Republican votes than any other piece of legislation sponsored by EQCA

"The California Assembly sent a powerful message today that all Californians deserve protection from violence," said EQCA Executive Director Geoff Kors. "This vital bill seeks to end abuse and assault against LGBT prisoners, ensuring they receive equal and fair protection under the law.

MAINE BECOMES FIFTH STATE TO Allow Same Sex Marriage — New Hampshire May Follow

On May 6, 2009 the Governor of Maine signed legislation making his state the fifth state in the nation to allow same sex marriage. The bill takes effect 90 days after the close of the legislature for the year. According to a spokesperson for the legislature, same sex couples will probably be able to marry in Maine by mid-September of this year.

Massachusetts, Connecticut, Vermont and Iowa already allow same sex marriage. Maine is now the second state in which the state legislature has approved same sex marriage without being required to do so by their state Supreme Court.

New Hampshire and New York State may not be far behind. A bill to permit same sex

marriage in that state has been approved by both houses of the New Hampshire legislature. However, it currently is back in its house of origin (the state House of Representatives) for their agreement with changes made to the bill in the state Senate before the Senate approved the bill.

A spokesperson for the Clerk of the House of Representatives said the house vote might occur later today (May 6). If the house agrees to the changes, the bill would go to the Governor for his signature or veto. A spokesperson for the Governor's office says the Governor has not yet taken a position on the bill.

New York State's legislature is also working on a bill to allow same sex marriage. Their bill, AO7732, has been approved by their Assembly Judiciary Committee and is awaiting a final vote on the Assembly floor. A spokesperson for the bill's author, Assembly Member O'Donnell, says the floor vote is not

likely before the week of May 11.

And as of this writing, the New Hampshire legislature has sent a bill, legalizing same sex marriage, to their Governor. By the time you read this article we will know if he signed that bill and made New Hampshire the 6th state to approve same sex marriage.

¹Meanwhile we in California anxiously await a decision by our Supreme Court on the validity of Proposition 8. That decision should be announced sometime between now and the first week in June.

GAYS IN THE MILITARY

The following statement is found on President Obama's transition web site; "Barack Obama agrees with former Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff John Shalikashvili and other military experts that we need to repeal the "don't ask, don't tell" policy. The key test for military service should be patriotism, a sense of duty, and a willingness to serve. Discrimination should be prohibited."

However, an end to the ban on gays in the military probably will not occur soon for at least two reasons. First, the President has a lot else on his hands. He will need to deal with the economy, health care, and several other key issues before getting to the issue of sexual orientation based discrimination by the military.


Second, what happened to President Clinton requires that President Obama prepare the ground before pushing for a change in military policy. Clinton, soon after becoming President, just announced that he would end the ban on gays in the military by executive order. He did none of the political work needed to persuade a majority of those in Congress to support the change. So, ultimately, he was forced to sign a bill that put the Don't Ask Don't Tell policy into law. That means Obama must persuade Congress to change the law. That will take time.

There actually is a bill in Congress to end the ban on gays in the military. It is H.R.1283, introduced by Ellen Tauscher, Democrat of California. Currently the bill has 140 cosponsors. Twenty five of those co-sponsors are from California Two hundred eighteen votes would be needed get the bill approved by the house of Representatives.

But first it must go through committee hearings. Currently it is in the Military Personnel Subcommittee of the House Armed Services Committee. That subcommittee has fifteen members and seven of those are co-sponsors of the bill. If it gets out of the subcommittee it will need 31 votes to be approved by the full House Armed Services Committee. Currently 16 members of the full committee are co-sponsors of the bill.

One hitch in the prospects for the passage of the bill is that it's author has been nominated for Under Secretary of State for Arms Control. If her nomination is approved by the Senate, a new author will have to be found for the bill. A spokesperson for the Servicemembers Legal Defense Network, chief sponsors of the bill, pledges they will find a new author should that happen.

As they say, patience is a virtue. That is especially true in legislative advocacy.

Minister Terminated at Westminster Presbyterian Church

Months after the Sacramento Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in the USA started an investigation of undisclosed charges by a six member commission of the Presbytery of the ministry of the Reverend Doctor David Thompson at Sacramento's historic Westminster Presbyterian Church located on N street across from the Capitol at a May 11, 2009 meeting at the church it was announced Rev. Thompson has been put on administrative leave pending

negotiations of his severance package. Rev. Thompson is an employee of the Sacramento Presbytery not Westminster.

In the April, 2009, minutes of the Presbytery posted on the Internet it was reported the commission had met 11 times, talked to 29 people in person or on the phone, met with several of the church committees, talked to 25 people in person of members, and received 28 pieces of correspondence from the congregation and 16 letters from the community "to help with Dr. Thompson's evaluation." Westminster, which now bills itself as "A house of prayer for all people," was the typical downtown church in decline with an aging membership when Rev. Thompson became pastor and under his guidance the church has experienced arouth with in influx of vouncer families and many new gay periodicipates who

growth with in influx of younger families and many new gay parishioners who have become an integral part of the church.

Rev. Thompson has long been a strong supporter of the LGBT communities and is often speaker at marriage equality rallies. While many may not know him by name most recognize him by his bright

white hair.

Many of the members supporting him feel he has been targeted because of his support for the LGBT communities and his defiance of a controversial edict the Sacramento Presbytery passed a couple of years ago forbidding churches in the presbytery from ordaining LGBT members as elders and deacons. 
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

close! My parents are amazing. I don't think anyone really appreciates their parents until their older and I certainly do now. I was really close to my Grandmother who passed away last September one month shy of her 90th birthday. I miss her a lot. But, the last few years were very hard for her. Her mind was completely intact, but her body was just wore out. She's not suffering anymore, so I'm grateful for that. It killed me to see her so miserable, but I still miss her though.

At what age did you know you were gay? Was coming out hard for you? People have a hard time believing me when I tell them I've known since I was five — same time Ty's mama knew in *Sordid Lives*. (Laughs.) In kindergarten I saw some of the girls trying to kiss all the boys & I thought that was a good idea, so I tried it to. The teacher told me that boys don't kiss other boys and I guess you could say that's when I went back in the closet. It was really hard coming out to my family, but they had completely the opposite reaction than what I thought they would. Now, in reflection, I wonder why I waited so long.

wonder why I waited so long. Why did you decide to go into nursing? That's a funny story, but the short version is that I was a computer finance major and part of that program involved taking a science class. Within one semester I realized that I had a knack for anatomy and physiology. So I studied and got my EMT license. I spent a couple of months riding in ambulances, but kept getting carsick from all the bouncing around in the back of the rig. When a patient looked up at me from the gurney one day and asked me, "Are you OK?", I decided it was time to rethink my career. (Laughs.) I applied for a job in the nursing pool at Sutter and have been there ever since.

ever since. What's your official nursing title? I'm a Unit Secretary/Patient Care Technician/Monitor Technician. Kind of a Jack-of-all-trades I guess you could say.

What exactly do you do? I've worked in the Surgical ICU at Sutter Memorial Hospital for over 10 years now. Most of our patients are recovering from Open Heart Surgery. We also do recovery for patients having brain surgery, vascular surgeries, or other surgeries requiring ICU observation. I joke to people when they ask what I do, that I'm like Radar on "M*A*S*H". I'm kinda the go-to guy for everything. I coordinate all patient care for all the patients in the unit. I answer the phones, deal with patients, family, nurses, doctors, Ancillary Depts., as well as maintain the day to day operations of the ICU

day operations of the ICU. What's a typical day like for you? Never boring! (Laughs.) But, I'm like a duck — above the water I'm gliding across the surface, underneath the surface I'm padding like hell. Does working in this field make you more back comparisons. I don't know if it

Does working in this field make you more health conscious? I don't know if it makes me more health conscious, but I try my best to stay in shape. Work is so crazy, busy most of the time though that I have developed pretty awful eating habits. I really need to work on that. Working in the medical field though gives me an importance of how precious life is and how so many people take their health for granted.

What's the upside? I have been able to take better care of my family and friends when they have been in the hospital. Unless you are being a royal [pain in the ass], most doctors and nurses welcome input from a patient's loved ones. It helps them give better care to the patient. Never be afraid to ask questions, or to have something explained to you.

to you. What's the downside? Crazy hours, high stress levels and not really wanting to do anything on your days off except veg on the couch!

Are you out at work? Yeah.

What's it like being gay in the health field? I've had my share of homophobia, but for the most part the medical field is very gayfriendly and has been for decades.

friendly and has been for decades. Are there a lot of opening gay people in your line of work? Tons. Doctors, Nurses, Ancillary Depts. Want me to name them? (Laughs.) Just kidding. What health advice would you offer people? Blood goes round and round air

What health advice would you offer people? Blood goes round and round, air goes in and out — any variation on that is a bad thing. (Laughs.) No really, things you should not ignore: chest pain = possible heart attack; slurred speech, paralysis, loss of vision = possible stroke; numb and/or cold limb = possible blood clot; the list goes on and on. I think everybody should know the minimum basics of the how the human body works, what it needs to keep working and what the signs are when it's not working properly. Everything has an owner's manual these days. Shouldn't we have one too?

How did you become involved with Sordid Lives? I watched the movie with some friends on a camping trip and became a fan. When I found out Lambda Players doing it two years ago I really wanted to audition. My partner, TJ Bruce, was just getting ready to open Badlands and I decided he needed my help with the opening, so I didn't audition. It was really hard to let an opportunity like that go by, but I couldn't take that much time away from helping TJ. After Badlands was open and running smoothly, a friend of mine on the cast of Sordid Lives told me that the guy set to play Ty had dropped out a week before opening night. I auditioned against three other guys and got the part. If that wasn't fate, I don't know what is. When I was asked to do the role again, I was thrilled to accept it.

I was thrilled to accept it. **Do you have anything in common with the character of Ty?** A lot actually. We're both gay actors who are close to our moms. Ty is a very emotional and sensitive person. He spends a lot of time analyzing what his feelings mean and why he feels the way he does. I can relate to that.

Is acting something you would like to do more of? There are a hundred things I wish I had more time to do and acting is certainly one of them. But my main focus right now is going back to school. I am trying to get into a Physician Assistants Program. It's a huge commitment once I get in, but it will be worth it.

What do you enjoy most about the show? It's a great play with an awesome cast. But, my favorite part is getting to work with Bethany Hidden again. She has such a lovely voice and is a kick in the pants to be around.


The Sordid Lives of Steve Thompson

The Housing Market: Are We Still Blowing Bubbles? I honestly don't think anyone expected the housing bubble to not just burst, but take down the entire global economy to the extent that it has. Many people didn't think there even was a bubble. Those that did think there was one, never predicted it would be this bad. The majority of us aren't anywhere near being an economist, and even those who were didn't agree. How were we to know what to expect? Everything seemed just wonderful. I've been right smack dab in the middle of it (on a ground level) for the last 8 ½ years, and I've learned a little bit about what's been going on behind the scenes. I'd like to share my take on some things with you, and point out the dirty little secrets I know about what's being billed now as solutions to the problem. I do this because I hope we will stand up against injustice, and find honest solutions through honest means.

My opinion is that everything appearing to be economically wonderful during the mid 2000's was no accident. There are certainly plenty of fingers to be pointed around, and even I'm not completely immune to some blame being sent my way, but I'll tell you, I'm much more ethical than 95% of the people I've worked with in the industry. Greed, and the thought "everyone's doing it, so it must be OK" can really make people lose their minds from what I've seen. Bad training should be thrown in the mix for fairness sake. Still, I don't think this situation was caused by homeowners buying things they really couldn't afford, mortgage brokers doing anything it took to intentionally process as many liar loans as they could, or even banks encouraging all of it and intentionally selling bad loans (that's why banks make bad loans, they sell them to someone else and tell them it's good). I think you gotta look up a little higher than that though.

These things never would have happened if the banking regulations would have been enforced, but they weren't. You wanna know why? The Bush/Cheney train wreck told the regulators not to enforce anything. Let's see, how can we take control of the oil from the Middle East (Bush was an oil guy, although he sucked at it), make a Trillion dollars for Halliburton (Cheney was a former Executive with Halliburton, who they privatized and outsourced the war to), and keep the American people fat, dumb and happy so they don't object? Hmm, let's spend 10 Billion dollars a month taking over the Middle East by force and build permanent military bases there, hire Halliburton to do it, and let the banks, Wall Street, and real estate go crazy. The citizens will all just go out and buy Hummers and be happy, then we can sell them \$5 a gallon gas and make a bunch more money off of that, making our oil buddies really happy. Yeah, that will work, let's do that. Conspiracy theory? Maybe, but it sure does all fit very nicely into place retrospectively. It has to make you wonder, doesn't it?

The important question though is, what do we do about it now? Have we woken up from our Hummer coma? I'd like to think so, and I think the election of Barack Obama is a reflection of us having woken up to some extent, but we really need to keep paying attention. We're still unemployed, so upside down in our houses that we don't know what to do, and probably going to have to pay \$10 a gallon for gas someday soon. We all have to have the attitude that enough is enough in my opinion. No more greed, selfishness, and complacency will work for any of us. Anyway, I want to talk to you about the newest housing remedies, and focus on the problems that are appearing with them.

Let's start with the newest mortgage term "loan modification". This is currently the worst offender. The same mortgage brokers who got you into the bad loan in the first place now want to SELL you a way out of it. This is a complete scam designed for them to make more money from you. They haven't been able to sell you bad loans anymore, because you don't have any equity left because of all the bad loans. Now, they want to sell you something else. Homeowners are desperate enough to find a way out that they want to believe them, but what they're not telling you is, if you qualify for a modification, you can get it for free. You don't have to pay their \$4,000 commission. All you have to do is call your bank. Just pick of the phone and call them. Believe me, you won't be the only one, and they will have someone to transfer you about 15 times to tell you what they need from you. The other really scary thing to be weary of is, some of the modification companies are just going to steal your money and not do anything for you. I wouldn't consider paying anyone a dime for this.

If you would like to do some research, just visit www.hud.gov or call 1-888-995-HOPE (4673). The Making Home Affordable program is right on the top of the front page on the HUD website (Department of Housing and Urban Development) right now. There is a 5 question questionnaire that lets you know if you're eligible. You can find out the facts, instead of paying money you probably don't have for a sales pitch.

As a side note, someone recently told me it lowers your credit score 200 points if you get a modification, which really irritates me if it is the case, but I don't know much about it yet. I will try and look into this, stayed tuned.

Next on the list (maybe it should be first) is FHA financing — Let me start by saying, not all mortgage brokers are crooks, you just have to be very careful that you are dealing with an honest reputable broker. Ask a lot of questions, and if you don't get honest reasonable answers, maybe you may need to find another FHA approved broker. Use your sense and be careful of slick talkers.

FHA financing is not funded by FHA. FHA financing is insurance for banks to make loans they normally wouldn't, which is guaranteed with taxpayer dollars. The intent was to help lower income people be able buy a reasonable house. While this is a worthy intent, it is not immune from corruption. Oh, and they also handle reverse mortgages for seniors, who could potentially be the weakest of all victims when it comes to someone losing their house and all their life savings.

The Congress passed a bill called "Hope for homeowners" in October of 2008, to insure \$300 billion worth of home loans. They intended to get people out of sub-prime loans and into FHA insured loans instead, so as to stop the foreclosure problem. We really do have to stop the foreclosures somehow, and FHA is a good program with affordable fixed interest rates, as long as it's not abused. Unfortunately, were there is money, there is greed.

They've raised the loan limits on FHA financing. Per the FHA website, the limits for Sacramento County are currently between \$580,000 - \$1,115,400 for 1 to 4 unit properties. That sounds a little high from where I sit. Really high. The median price for all single family residences sold in Sacramento County within the last month is \$165,000 per the Multiple Listing Service used by local real estate agents. 4-plexes over the last 6 months, \$200,000. What did you say those limits were again? Did I read that right?

Yet, my biggest problem with FHA is from an appraiser's perspective. Appraisals are critical because they determine how much the collateral is worth, which then directly dictates how much debt will be allowed. Recent legislation has been enacted that no longer allows mortgage brokers to select which appraiser they want, because they pick the appraiser that will give them the highest appraisal (which leads to fraud). FHA is exempt though. Hmm, why is that?

FHA approved appraisers are placed on a roster on the FHA website. Mortgage brokers routinely go to the website, find all of the appraisers in a given area, then start doing what we call "dialing for dollars". They call up the appraiser and usually say something like "I have this order for an appraisal. Can you tell me how much the property is worth (site unseen)? If the property is worth enough that the deal will work, you can have the order." If the appraiser says no (as they should be if they are following the law and FHA guidelines, but many, many do not), or gives them a number lower than what they want, they call the next appraiser on the list until they get the property valued much higher than it's worth in many cases. While the appraisals may get reviewed sometimes, many get through somehow. I know for a fact that FHA is aware of this practice and does nothing. I have spoken with a very high ranking official there, and was told "it's always been that way, and we don't have the resources to deal with it". It was also said, but carefully worded, that if appraisers complain too much, FHA might not use them anymore. So, if you don't hit the number, lie, and commit fraud, you don't get the work. Many have chosen to go along so that they can keep food on their tables. I kind of don't want to do FHA appraisals anymore, because I don't want to participate in fraud; however I too need to keep food on the table, and pay my taxes. I try and just balance it by only working for the few honest ones, which are pretty tough to find. For any of you that are honest and are reading this, thank you so much.

Now, I know some of you are thinking, I want my house to be worth more, but it's really not good to get an inaccurate high value. I can't begin to tell you how many homeowners say "give me a good appraisal". Their definition of good of course is high. The end result if your property is over valued is that you owe more in debt than you have in equity, which is kinda what happened to our housing market, isn't it?

Yeah, I know we're trying to avoid foreclosures through expanded FHA financing and other programs, but are we setting ourselves up for more of the same, with taxpayers (you and I) paying the bill again in the near future? Can we really afford it? Aren't we already imploding now? I care about these issues more as a citizen than as an appraiser. I don't think we have even yet begun to see the social problems that are the end result of this mess. Enough is enough, and it's up to each and every one of us to learn from our mistakes, not be greedy or selfish, and try not to be complacent about those that are. It's really all of our faults.

This is the health issue so I am going to write about a health issue which affects millions of Americans and appears to be a growing threat to our national health, diabetes.

There are two types of diabetes, Type 1, often referred to as Juvenile Onset Diabetes, which means the person probably has diabetes from birth but often is not discovered until pre-adolescence and is often serious enough that when discovered the child must immediately be put on insulin therapy and remain on insulin therapy the rest of their lives.

Type 2 diabetes is usually caused in people like me who are over weight. It generally can be "managed" with diet and oral medications. Symptoms can be constant thirst, frequent urination, and lack of energy.

Before I was diagnosed, I was constantly sipping on a 32 oz. glass of water, urinating every 15 or 20 minutes and it took me all day just to wash dishes. (The dishwasher was broken, so to speak). Denial is also a frequent symptom of diabetes.

The weight thing can be a real catch 22 because one is not burning off the fat, one gains weight. Over my lifetime I have averaged gaining about 5 pounds a year. While that doses not seem like much, as it accumulates, it becomes more and more of a problem. Fortunately, I have lost 40 pounds in the last year and am determined to continue to lose until I have lost at least 100 pounds. I really need to lose 150 pounds.

Diabetes is caused by the body failing to properly utilize or produce insulin in the body to convert sugars into energy. And, like HIV/AIDS, the fastest growing

And, like HIV/AIDS, the fastest growing segment of our population being affected by diabetes is the African-American, Latino and Asian/Pacific Islander populations.

While there is much research being done to combat diabetes it is still the leading cause of over 90% of amputations that take place in our country.

place in our country. Most of these amputations are caused as the result of the diabetic failing to notice a sore on the foot which gets infected and by the time it is noticed it is too late to save the foot and amputation is necessary.

A diabetic should make it a daily ritual to examine for any kind of sore or crack in the skin on their feet. Often times cracks which can lead to infections appear in calluses. If little cracks are found, a skin lotion should be applied to keep the skin soft and prevent infections.

Diabetes can cause the nerves in the legs, feet and hands to deaden. This condition is called neuropathy. I have talked to several diabetics with this condition who failed to do the daily foot exam and went weeks with a tack pressing into their foot. Feeling no pain, by the time they noticed an infection it was too late. They lost their foot.

If the diabetic is on Medicare he/she can obtain a pair of shoes once every two years designed to prevent sores on the feet. They should consult their podiatrist or healthcare provider about obtaining this benefit. I have had neuropathy in my feet and

I have had neuropathy in my feet and legs for several years and have found it more and more difficult to walk any distance, climb stairs or stand for more than 10 minutes. For that reason I have taken to the use of a cane as a walking aid and a walker with a seat when going to rallies and such where there is no place to sit

ON THE FOREIGN FRONT

Doug Ireland in the April 30, 2009 issues of the Gay City News reports: "Ali Hili, the 33-year-old gay Iraqi exile who coordinates the association Iraqi LGBT, which is headquartered in London but has members and informants throughout Iraq, told Gay City News that he has also been able to confirm the use of lethal anal torture. "We have had reports, increasingly over the last four or five days, about the use of this technique not just in Baghdad but in smaller town and cities all over Iraq," Hili said by telephone. "We have reports on seven young men who have been through this horrible experience in which they were arrested in the south of Iraq and had their anuses sealed, or 'locked' as the torturers say.

Our sources told us that hospitals all over Iraq's southern region have received so many cases of similar incidents where men have had their anuses glued, but that what makes the situation even worse and more lethal is that they have been refused treatment in hospitals when they sought it because of homophobia.' ... As of this week, Hili and Iraqi LGBT have documented 617 cases of assassinations of LGBT people since a death-to-all-gays fatwa was issued by Grand Ayatollah Ali al-Sistani, the spiritual leader of all Shiite muslims in Iraq, in 2005. The murder campaign of "sexual cleansing" of homosexuals has intensified in recent months, with 70 new killings since December alone."

The U. S. Embassy in Bagdad on April 14 responded to Representative Jared Polis, (D-CO), the first openly gay man to be elected to Congress, about his request for them to look into the plight of gay men in Iraq, "We have seen the international media report according to Amnesty International, as many as 25 men and boys were killed over the past few weeks by militia or relatives influenced by religious leaders who have publicly condemned homosexuality. (We are aware of but cannot confirm reports that the toll may be higher and may include children.) Reports from Embassy contacts familiar the areas where some of the bodies were found suggest the killings are the work of militias who believe homosexuality is a form of Western deviance that cannot be tolerated."

Representative Polis' office had no comment on Doug Ireland's article or if his office is doing anything to monitor the situation of LGBT people in Uganda and Nigeria. They also failed to comment if they are doing anything to monitor Scott Lively and the activities of Watchmen on the Walls around the world.

In Uganda, people are being blackmailed in order to keep from being revealed as gay and are paying the blackmail whether they are gay or not.

Marriage fever has struck in Moscow as two sisters are presenting themselves on May 12 at the Moscow Marriage Registration Office to request a marriage license. I will let you know the results of that request in the next soliloguy.

Out brothers and sisters in Moscow are making their fourth attempt to conduct a gay pride march on May 16.

Three previous yearly attempts to obtain a permit for a march have been denied by the mayor.



Color, vibrant colors greet you at Celestin's restaurant. From the outside, to the inside with its Haitian framed flag folk art, to the beautiful watercolor by Mama Celestin, and lastly and most importantly, the food. It's all a beautiful medley of colors.

all a beautiful modely of colors. While I am adventuresome, there are some foods I have yet to try. Not because of fear, but more as our region has so many different kinds of foods that we often get stuck with our usual host of tried and true. Caribbean and Cajun cuisine never really passes through my mind when trying to decide what to have for dinner. After eating at Celestin's, this most assuredly has changed. The food was nothing short of spectacular. I may have been in downtown Sacramento, but I felt as if I had been transported to a land far away.

My dining partner for this review was my lovely daughter Jenn. She had heard of the restaurant and walked by many times always admiring the colors and smells from outside, but had never ventured in. When I told her I wanted to review the place she stated she had over the years heard wonderful things about their Mojito's. So, it was a lunch date.

You can't miss Celestin's on K. Street. It's one of only a few places in the vicinity with real color. In this monochromatic world we live in right now, all restaurants seem to be boring brown with white table clothes, chrome accents and maybe a color splash here and there to keep you awake. You don't have to worry about that at Celestin's. Color abounds in this place. Bright blues, pinks, greens greet you at each turn. It's different, it's nice. Music playing in the background is Haitian music or reggae, something different ... something fun



... something that let's you know you are in for an exciting experience.

As we sat, the very welcoming staff asked if we would like a drink from the "Voodoo" lounge. Having heard so much about the Mojito's it was an easy nod of the head "yes!" They arrived promptly and were sheer perfection. Not to sweet, the rum not overpowering, simply put: Perfect! Our lunch started with Chicken

Our lunch started with Chicken Empanadas house made of course (as is the entire menu). They were piping hot, full of wonderful moist seasoned chicken. The empanadas came with a cilantro-lime cream sauce, which was perfection. They were polished off quickly and I continued to dip my finger into the sauce as it was so yummy! Next we had fried Calamari.



Perfectly seasoned and meaty. The calamari was fried and served with two very different dipping sauces. The first was a remoulade sauce that was very tasty, reminiscent to a spicy tarter sauce, the second however was unmistakable and something I had never had before. It was a ti-malice sauce, which in Haitian translates to "little devil" sauce. It was flavorful, a bit spicy and had a soft warm vinegar taste. We used all of it up and asked for more. So different than anything I had every tried before.

For our main courses we opted to share two very different entrees. The first to arrive to the table was the salmon salad. Beautifully presented, colorful (as stated many times already) and almost to wonderful to dig in, but dig in we did. The rather large salad consists of a plentiful size piece of poached salmon, French feta cheese, mixed organic greens, asparagus, tomatoes, red onions, two slices of flat bread and a creamy Dijon dressing. The dressing did not over power the dish, it complemented all the fresh ingredients. I asked the chef (and owner Colin) what the dressing was, as actually it was so smooth and creamy and I would not have thought it to be a Dijon dressing. Colin stated that he emulsifies his dressing into this creamy luxurious sauce and adds just a touch to the salad, so that the flavors from the food are forward, with the dressing just in the background. The dish was outstanding. The second entrée was from the Seafood,

The second entrée was from the Seafood Meat, and Poultry section of the menu. Paella. Served over the best saffron rice I have ever tasted was a medley of chicken, sausage, tiger shrimp, and scallops. Celestin's does not skimp on quality or quantity. This dish amplifies this. It was plentiful, colorful (again that word), and so delicious that my daughter and I fought over the leftovers.

I review lots of restaurants and always enjoy the experience, but there was something very unique about Celestin's. Not only were the owners so kind and gracious, they actually cared about the food and the dining experience. This is rare today. There is a reason this restaurant has been in business since 1983. Celestin's opened its doors in 1983 on J. Street, and in 2001 moved to the current location. It's still a family run business with one of the owners present at all times ensuring a quality meal. All the recipes are family recipes that have been passed down and changed very little. The passion in the kitchen is as clear as the passion at the front of the house. Every employee that walked by the table smiled and asked if everything was okay, not so unusual, but what was unusual is that you could tell they really cared. Passion for their food, their restaurant, your experience was evident by each staff member.

The menu has something for everyone including vegetarian dishes. The back of the menu is full of beverages including beers,




wine, champagne and specialty cocktails. When you go experiment and try something different. My recommendation is the Luxury Mojito made with Barbancourt 15 year rum, Kenwood Yulupa Cuvee Brut, lime and mint. Treat yourself to something luxurious ... you're worth it!

OK, so if all that was not so cool what is even cooler is that they have two happy hours!! They have a Happy Hour Tuesday-Sunday from 4 - 6 p.m. with drink and appetizer specials abound. Celestin's is open every day except Monday (these artists deserve a day to themselves!). They are open for lunch and dinner. Check out their website at celestinseats.com



BATTLE FOR TERRA

Exercise Tips & Secrets

FUELING YOUR WORKOUTS!

Proper nutrition is an essential component to overall health and wellness and the best way to ensure the most effective workout and good performance. What is eaten before, during and after exercise has a major impact on performance, allowing one to maintain high quality training, improve recovery times and to feel good. Remember, what is eaten before exercise can make the difference between an energetic and a tired workout. Follow these basic guidelines for fueling your workouts:

Workouts: Early Morning Workouts: Within an hour after wake up, eat around 200 - 300 calories. Bagels, raisins, bananas, low-fat granola bars, or liquid meal beverages help avoid feelings of dizziness and hunger. Allow 30 minutes for digestion in order to avoid nausea. Avoid too much fat or protein, since these take longer to digest. Simple sugars (like juice) are absorbed the fastest, but can cause a quick rise and fall in blood sugar, which can make you tired. Lunchtime Workouts: 1-2 hours before a lunchtime workout, eat around 300-400 calories. Meal replacement shakes or bars.

Lunchtime Workouts: 1-2 hours before a lunchtime workout, eat around 300-400 calories. Meal replacement shakes or bars, yogurt, fruit (fresh or dried), or oatmeal help avoid hunger and fatigue. Avoid high fat and/or high protein foods, and stick with something that has around 60% carbohydrates, 20% protein and 20% fat. Make sure you eat a balanced meal after your workout!

Evening Workouts: 2-3 hours before leaving work, eat a small, balanced meal up to 500 calories. Best bets: Cheese and crackers, cottage cheese and veggies, fruit with a whole grain muffin. Example: string cheese with low-fat Triscuits and a small can of mandarin oranges. This will help relieve hunger pains that many people experience after exercise so you don't raid the fridge.

After the Workout: Quickly replace some of those calories you burned. The average person has about 30-minutes of ready energy stored as glycogen. Studies suggest that a carb/protein mixture stimulates quicker glycogen replacement over a 6-hour period.

Stay hydrated: Drink 16 or so ounces of water two hours before working out for optimum performance. Sip water throughout and after. Water is the best choice for fluid replacement for up to one hour, then consider switching to a sports drink.


Avoid exercising on an empty stomach: Eating before exercise produces greater stamina and endurance.

Figure out what works! Experiment, and find the right balance of eating and exercise. Every person has a different digestive system and requirements when it comes to nutrition and exercise. I've developed a dangerous habit.

This habit is consuming my life in so many ways that I've determined I'm in desperate need of help. It devours my income. It monopolizes all my time to the point that it's cut into my work life and has all but eliminated my hobbies. It's literally wasted my body away to a fraction of its former size, to a point where friends pass me on the street without recognizing me.

My habit is my personal trainer. If you'd told me two years ago that my largest monthly expense would be to pay off a muscle bound gym bunny to work me over twice a week I'd have had something else entirely in mind. Instead, I give all my money to a sadistic bastard in exchange for him making my life miserable twice a week. I imagine it's like being married.

As of yesterday, I've officially lost nearly 180 pounds over the past 15 months, putting me 60% of the way to my goal weight. The secret to my success? Building a relationship with a trainer seems to be a difficult thing. Everyone wants something different from their trainer, and each trainer offers a different set of pluses and minuses. I can't help but comparing the process to adopting a new pet. True, most trainers are capable of feeding and walking themselves, and rarely have accidents on the rug outside of the occasional wild weekend bender. But aside from that, you need to make sure that the "breed" of trainer you pick out is right for your needs and lifestyle. • The Spandex-thonged Cheerleader: Perky, upbeat and fond of extremely tight

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

MANDY MOORE Amanda Leigh



Following her critically-acclaimed previous album, Wild Hope, Mandy Moore returns with the highly anticipated, Amanda Leigh – to be released May 26, 2009 on Storefront Recordings – a new partnership with RED Music.

Co-written by Moore and primarily, Mike Viola, Amanda Leigh was recorded at engineer, Ducky Carlisle's modest basement studio in his home outside of Boston and features an impressive and eclectic collection of vintage equipment utilized throughout the album. Sharing many of the same musical influences of artists such as Todd Rundgren, Joni Mitchell, CSNY and Nilsson, among many others, Moore and Viola set out to create a compelling body of work, in which the instrumentation mirrors so much of what inspired and guided the duo from the onset.

The resulting collaboration, Amanda Leigh (Moore's given name), is a collection of personal reflections and insights about life and love as evidenced in songs such as "Nothing Everything," "Song About Home," and "Love to Love Me Back" – the latter also written with Inara George of The Bird and the Bee. Experimentation was also prevalent and encouraged throughout the writing/recording process, as exemplified in the rather tonguein-cheek, "I Could Break Your Heart Any Day of the Week" – originally a very alt-country sounding demo that quickly took on a new life with the addition of the clavinet, while "Everblue," co-written with Lori McKenna, simarily transformed with the inclusion of the Farfisa and Wurlitzer.

What is the status of Hawaiian monk seals and how will the new national monument designation in the waters around the Hawaiian Islands affect them?

Easily exploited by hunters, whalers and fishermen in the 19th century, Hawaiian monk seals essentially never recovered. As early as 1976, the Hawaiian monk seal was listed as endangered under the U.S. Endangered Species Act. The species is also on the International Union for the Conservation of Nature's (IUCN's) Red List of Threatened Species, and trade in the species or its parts is banned under the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species (CITES).

According to statistics from the U.S. National Marine Fisheries Service, beach counts of populations of Hawaiian monk seals declined by some 60 percent between 1958 and 1996. Today only 1,300-1,400 of the animals exist in the wild, and their populations have declined about four percent annually in recent years.

What makes marine biologists and environmentalists so sad to see Hawaiian monk seal populations dwindle is the fact that the charismatic mustachioed creatures are one of the few mammals known to science to have evolved very little from their ancestral beginnings some 15 million years ago. In a sense, the monk seals are living fossils, and provide scientists with a window in days long gone by.

In June 2006, the Bush administration created the Papahinaumokulkea Marine National Monument, a 1,200-mile-long, 140,000-square-mile stretch of open ocean northwest of Honolulu. The area is dotted with uninhabited islands and reefs that provide perfect habitat for some 7,000 different species of marine wildlife, a quarter of which, like the monk seal, are found nowhere else on the planet. The establishment of the monument ensures that no development or resource extraction will take place in the area, which is roughly the size of California and is the largest protected marine area in the world. Meanwhile, public access is restricted. And commercial and sport fishing will be phased out there within five years.

The establishment of the new national monument is key to saving the monk seals, as habitat loss is currently their chief threat, given that hunting is no longer allowed. Other threats include incidental capture in fishing gear, ingestion of fisheries debris or toxic substances, a decrease in prey availability monk seals are carnivores—and even intentional kills, in some cases by misguided fishermen thinking that the seals are competing for their catches. These factors, along with an inherently slow reproductive rate, continue to threaten the remaining Hawaiian monk seal population.

While the protection of critical habitat, such as in Papahanaumokuakea, is an important part of an overall strategy to try to save the charismatic species from extinction, other conservation efforts include learning more about the animals' reproductive habits, the rehabilitation and release of undersized seal pups that would not otherwise make it in the open ocean without help, captive breeding, the removal of marine debris, and the mitigation of other human disturbances from loud boat engines to oil spills. *Contacts: IUCN, www.iucn.org; CITES,*

We will need to replace our house gutters soon. What are our best options from an environmental perspective?

First understand clearly why your gutters need to be replaced. Are they rusted or broken? Are the fasteners no longer holding them in place? Or have the gutters leaked and failed to keep water out of your house? Answers to these questions will help you decide which type of gutter to choose.

Use a material that is the most durable for your climate; ultimately the longer your gutters last, the less environmental cost there will be in the product lifecycle, from manufacturing to recycling. A cheaper product that degrades twice as fast as another would not be the best choice, even if it does have a greener production process: The extra cost of having to fix your water-damaged home—and the health problems that could arise from exposure to mold—would make a "cheaper" gutter in reality much more costly.

"Galvanized steel, copper and aluminum are preferred gutter materials," reports Austin Energy, the Texas capitol's community-owned electric utility. Copper is a more expensive, high-end gutter material, as are stainless steel and wood, although wood is used mostly in historical restoration.

According to home improvement expert Don Vandervort, who writes for ThisOldHouse.com, steel and aluminum each have big pluses. Steel is sturdy, while aluminum will not rust. Copper and stainless steel are sturdy and lasting, too, says Vandervort, but they can cost three to four times as much as steel or aluminum. "Steel gutters can stand up to ladders and fallen branches better than aluminum," he says. "But even thick galvanized steel eventually rusts." He advises buying "the thickest you can afford." Austin Energy says that gutters should be a minimum of 26 gauge galvanized steel or 0.025 inch aluminum.

Polyvinyl chloride (PVC) is also used for gutters, but "can get brittle with age or in extreme cold," says Vandervort, and cannot carry as much snow load as metal gutters. PVC is also not a very green-friendly choice. The Center for Health, Environment and Justice (CHEJ) calls PVC plastic "one of the most hazardous consumer products ever created...dangerous to human health and the environment throughout its entire life cycle." When produced or burned, says CHEJ, PVC plastic releases dioxins, a group of potent synthetic chemicals that can cause cancer and harm the immune and reproductive systems.

Replacing your gutters can be an unfortunate expense, but it can provide an environmental opportunity, because the way you handle your roof's water is important. Consider linking your gutters to a "rooftop catchment system" that captures rainwater in a cistern or rain barrels and can then be used to water non-edible plantings. Efficient water use is a guideline in the U.S. Green Building Council's LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) for Homes standard for certifying green-built homes.

Finally, if you have a problem with debris, consider a RainTube. This recycled-plastic gutter insert (which won the 2008 Sustainable Product Award from Green Building Pages) keeps gutters clear of debris, preventing overflow into your house. Of course, cleaning your gutters now and then is probably the best environmental option in that it may head off any need for replacement or modification.


