FRIENDS WITH BENEFITS BY LANCE WILLIAMS

Recently I went through a type of breakup with someone ... We hadn't officially entered into a "relationship," but when we stopped seeing each other romantically, it still felt like a breakup to me. As soon as we had "the talk" about not dating anymore, he asked me if I still wanted to be a part of his life. I

thought seriously about it for a few seconds, and my answer was "Yes." And then I did something I've never actually done before in my life. I suggested to him that we become friends with benefits.

I never before had seen the point behind this type of relationship... But here it seemed to fit perfectly. We both wanted to remain in each other's lives. I knew that we were both still physically attracted to each other. Neither one of us really had the desire to go and have sex with other people. Why not try it? In the past, I had always thought, "If two people are regularly having sex and are attracted to each other as friends too, doesn't that basically constitute a relationship anyway? Why not just call it that?" With us, it became clear that putting a label on things and becoming any more serious is not an option right now. As much as that truly sucks for one of us, there is no way around it. Forcing a relationship NEVER turns out well.

I started thinking about what would happen if he and I actually followed through with being FWB's. The more I thought about it, the more I decided that it would make me quite happy. I couldn't remember the last time I enjoyed a sexual connection so much with someone, and I really do think the world of him as a person. If we ended up spending a decent amount of time just hanging out, that would be great too. Expecting more than that was off-limits, but that was the case whether we were FWB's or not.

There are those that are reading this now and thinking "Isn't that just torturing yourself to have an 'almost relationship' with someone with whom you'd prefer to have a full-fledged relationship?" That's a very valid concern that seems difficult to resolve. However, the only part that would be painful would be what I wanted and could NOT have, and that doesn't change regardless of our sexual circumstances. The only thing more ideal would be having a mental, physical, and EMOTIONAL connection. But is an emotional connection likely to develop if there's already a strong mental and physical connection? Hmmm. Either way, I started thinking that two out of three ain't bad.

All of a sudden, it seems like I've found a purpose for the FWB type of relationship. I have never really tried it, so I may not be perfect at it. (Maybe he suspected that because he declined to be more than just friends for right now.) But I'm pretty damn good at most things I really want to do, so I remain confident about my ability to be a good FWB. I take pride in the way I handle my connections with others. That's not to claim perfection, but I certainly try.

I spend a lot of my time thinking about relationships and, in particular, my relationships with people — I like them to be as strong as possible. I know that I have a lot to offer, and it makes me feel fulfilled when I can give myself to others. I believe this is a big part of what defines me as a person. We all have things that define us as individuals, whether they be our career, our religion, our body, our mind, our emotions, our social life, our possessions, our dreams and desires, our talents, our family, our past ... our vices. But I don't know many people who don't feel that their relationships with others define some of who they are as a person. I think we owe it to ourselves and each other to evaluate what our relationships mean to us and never take them for granted. They can end so quickly

In a very disappointing loss for the LGBTI community, the voters of Maine appear to have voted to overturn a law passed by their state legislature which permits same sex couples to marry in the State of Maine.

According to the Bangor Daily News (a newspaper in the state of Maine), at the time of this writing, with 94 % of the precincts counted the voters in the state voted 291,000 to 259,741 to overturn the law allowing same sex marriage. In other words, 52.84 % of the voters opposed same sex marriage and

47.16 % supported it.

The Bangor Times reports that 58% of the registered voters voted in this election. A reporter at the newspaper said this is a very high turnout rate for an off year election. He also noted that the supporters of same sex marriage in Maine spent more per voter than the supporters of marriage equality did in the California Proposition 8 campaign. Still, marriage equality went down to defeat in

This loss is yet another loss in a string of defeats for the supporters of same sex marriage. It remains true that the only entities that have supported same sex marriage in this nation are state legislators and state Supreme Courts. According to some sources, same sex marriage has lost at the ballot box at least 16 times.

According the records we have been able to find voters have previously approved bans on same sex marriage in at least the

following states:

Arizona, Arkansas, California (Twice), Florida, Georgia, Hawaii (voters gave the legislature the right to restrict marriage to opposite sex couples), Kentucky, Maine (in recent election), Michigan, Mississippi, Montana, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon and

The loss in Maine reinforces the view that we must prepare very carefully before we bring the issue of same sex marriage to the ballot box again in California. Clearly our community does not yet have a winning strategy on this issue. We should embark now on a strategy to change the views of the voters in our state. Only once we have clear evidence that the majority of California's voters support same sex marriage, should we go back to the ballot box. Going back to the voters too soon would waste precious, and limited, time and energy. That would make it even more difficult to mount a credible campaign in the future.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT OFFERS **GRANT ON LGBT AGING**

In what may be another example of the gay friendliness of the Obama administration, the US Department of Health And Human Services, Administration on Aging, is offering a grant to to fund a national resource center designed to provide national, state and local organizations, including those with a primary mission of serving LGBT individuals, with the information and technical assistance they need to effectively serve older gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender individuals. The Administration on Aging

announcement says, the development of the Resource Center is the first step in laying the groundwork necessary to bring about culture change both within the main stream aging services network, as well as within the LGBT community. They hope that, through the efforts of the Resource Center, the capacity of both service networks will be enhanced to better meet the needs of older gay men, lesbians, and bisexual and transgender individuals. Towards this end, the Resource Center will have three primary objectives as listed below.

 1.Educate mainstream aging services organizations about the existence and special needs of LGBT elders

Sensitize LGBT organizations about the existence and special needs of older adults
 Educate LGBT individuals about the


importance of planning ahead for future longterm care needs.

The Administration on Aging will award a single Resource Center grant at approximately \$250,000 per year, pending availability of funds. Eligible entities will include públic-private nonprofit organizations with experience working on LGBT issues on a national level.

Interested organizations must submit a letter of intent to apply for the grant by December 4, 2009.



Library Equipment Gets Second Life At Lavender Library

The Lavender Library, Archives, and Cultural Exchange exists to protect, preserve, and promote the LGBT experience and history in Sacramento by operating a lending library, as well as cultural, educational, and archival programs.

Under the direction of Michael Cook, Board Member and Volunteer Coordinator, the Lavender Library started a multi-phase redesign project nearly two years ago.

Almost nine months ago the Lavender Library's volunteers and staff completed phase one of a complete redesign of the Library's interior. After a generous second, in-kind donation from the Sacramento Public Library, the second phase is almost completed.

"Thanks go to the foresight of former Vice-president Kimber Johnson, who set up the initial contact that led the Lavender Library to become the recipient of over \$5,000 in donated fixtures and furniture.

"Phases one and two of the redesign have more than doubled the library's

shelf space. Thanks to the hard work of our volunteers, the installation of over 300 new shelves and fixtures is near completion," said Cook. Total cost of materials for both phases was less than \$200.

Three weeks ago, Cook received the keys from Lois Casement Ross, Sacramento Public Library Authority, to access and retrieve fixtures and furniture from the Sacramento Valley High Branch Library.

The Valley High Branch had relocated and replaced its fixtures. Cook and new volunteer Mike Winn used two pickup trucks and plenty of muscle to remove all the donated fixtures within 24 hours.

Working on the installation with Cook were Bren Ahearn, David Ayotte, and Tyson Redhouse. Thanks to the many people who volunteered their time and energy in many different ways, to make this redesign a reality.

"I'm currently working on plans for the phase three redesign," added Cook, "which includes leather reading chairs, interior paint, a modern urban feel, and illuminated exterior signage. If you haven't been in lately, stop by and check out our fresh, open, functional space."

With the Library's great volunteers, staff and Board, Cook envisions phase three as becoming a reality in the near future.

"I hope many more people will volunteer and learn what a wonderful resource Sacramento has here in the Lavender Library, Archives and Cultural Exchange. I'd like to reach out to past volunteers and invite new volunteers," said Cook.

WOMEN'S VOICES

I know I said I was going to write about the Las Vegas Girlfest adventure, but Girlfest was a bust. I had a great time with the band (RWCB) and the "To Wong Fu" road trip clan, but I think we may have been the only people that went to Vegas for the Girlfest event (besides the vendors that weren't selling anything). The organizers didn't seem to quite have it together. What can I say?

It's been a while since I wrote about the real estate market, so I decided I'd let you know what's been happening on that front instead. If you remember my last article about real estate, I went on a rant about the taxpayer insured FHA program being exploited. Well, what do you know?

On October 9, 2009 the New York Times came out with an article suggesting FHA may need a federal bailout. The reason why you ask? Because about 24% of the FHA insured loans from 2007, and about 20% from 2008 are possibly facing foreclosure. FHA has a billion dollars a day worth of loans going into default, or 7.7% of their portfolio.

The reason is because FHA stepped in to rescue and replace sub-prime lending when the lenders stopped refinancing and making sub-prime loans, but maybe FHA went too far and just created another mess by acting like the sub-prime lenders had in the first place. When will we get it?

The good news is that FHA has started to increase their concern with risk management. Hopefully it's not too late. As a real estate appraiser, most of my job is what the average home owner doesn't

They often seem to be under the impression that the appraisal is like a home inspection, but it isn't. A home inspector's function is to make sure all of the systems within a home are working. The appraiser comes out and measures the house, takes pictures, and looks at the overall condition and upgrades of the home, but assumes all systems are working unless something obvious is noticed.

Most of the appraisal work is actually done behind the scenes in the form of market research. The market conditions analysis plays a huge role in the final opinion of value the appraiser comes up with. We look at a wide variety of economic factors such as employment rates, interest rates and types of financing available, value trends, amount of available inventory, marketing times, foreclosure rates, etc.

Under current market conditions lenders are very concerned with the market analysis. Many areas of the Sacramento region have not seen

declining values since the end of 2008.

While this sounds like great news, I'm not convinced we are out of the woods yet. Most of the available inventory has been foreclosure and short sale listings (properties being sold for less than what is owed to the bank in lieu of foreclosure), and these properties are being bought quickly in a competitive environment, mostly by investors paying cash, or with special financing like FHA insured or VA loans.

The real estate market has traditional seasonal trends though, and traditionally there are more buyers in the spring and summer than in the fall and winter. In addition, there are rumors that many banks are holding back foreclosure inventory and the market could once again be flooded with foreclosures, which has the potential to drive prices down even further.

If that weren't enough, interest rates have been kept so low, and tax incentives have been offered to buyers, there is concern that interest rates could skyrocket, and that the investor type buyers might disappear when the tax incentives do.

The key to successful investing is timing. It is difficult to say when it's the best time to buy because even industry "experts" can't predict the future with certainty. We can only look at all of the information available to us at the time and try to make the best decisions we can.

If you are considering buying a home you should consider that interest rates are currently at historical lows and may significantly increase in the future. When that will be we do not know at this point,

but the increase in rates is believed to be looming.

The rates right now are at about 5% - 6%, and if you'll remember back in the 80's we saw interest rates in the teens. Home prices have dropped very low compared to the market peak in about 2005/2006, but there is no guarantee they will not go lower. Here's the rub, if you wait too long for prices to go lower, the rate might increase and make the cost of buying a home higher despite the actual price of the home.

Then again, if you go out and buy a house, the price of your new home may go lower, and interest rates might stay low for a while longer, so later you might think that you could have done better. I'll leave you with one final thought though. A real estate investment is supposed to be a long term investment. I believe that was a big mostly unnoticed part of the problem we had during the boom.

Most of the buyers were younger people that saw a get rich quick scheme in progress all around them, and they jumped on the bandwagon.

Those that jumped at the wrong time got burned. Most older people (like my grandmother) bought their home a long time ago, saved their money for a down payment, bought what they could actually afford, and had no plans to sell. They didn't refinance or take cash out. They just paid their principle month in and month out, with a goal of eventually owning their home free and clear.

My grandmother isn't getting foreclosed. Maybe we need to start thinking more like this and less like the show "Flip this House".





LOW-FAT THANKSGIVING!

Turkey has little fat, is full of protein, and is an important source of B vitamins. Turkey breast is your best bet, but be sure to remove the skin first. A three-ounce serving of skinless turkey breast has about 120 calories and one gram of fat. If you choose to eat dark meat instead, a three-ounce skinless serving delivers around 160 calories and six grams of fat (two grams of which are saturated)

Cranberries are a great source of vitamin C and contain compounds that are believed to block certain bacteria that cause infections. Add oranges to make cranberry orange sauce and you add even more vitamin C, or add apples to make cranberry apple sauce.

Sweet potatoes are a rich source of beta carotene, vitamin C, vitamin E, potassium, and fiber. Leave out the butter and excess sugar. Use orange juice and a sprinkling of brown sugar for flavor instead. Limit your portion size to no more than half a cup.

Regular potatoes are also an excellent source of vitamins and minerals. Lose the butter and heavy cream in mashed potatoes, and use reduced sodium, fat-free chicken broth or fat-free milk and sour cream instead. Flavor with garlic, fresh herbs, and ground black pepper. Keep your portion size small.

Gravy and stuffing are notorious sources of fat and calories. Make a lower-fat gravy by straining the fat from the drippings (a fat separator makes the job easier), and using cornstarch or a sprinkling of flour as thickening agents rather than a butter and flour roux. Add extra flavor to your gravy by using herbs and wine. You can make a low-fat stuffing by omitting butter, using fat-free broth and, perhaps, lean turkey or chicken sausage instead of pork sausage. Omit sausage altogether if you like and use meaty mushrooms and extra vegetables instead.

Vegetables should be steamed or roasted rather than slathered in butter or cheesy sauces. Skip the fried onions rings on top of the green beans (add toasted almonds or walnuts instead), and use vinaigrette dressing or herbs for flavor. Make sweet glazed acorn squash rings, sautéed green beans, roasted carrots and parsnips, or ciderglazed brussel sprouts.

Pumpkin is a terrific source of beta carotene and fiber. Enjoy a lighter-crust pumpkin pie by using phyllo dough. Use egg whites, or egg substitute, and fat-free evaporated milk in the filling. Great low-fat Thanksgiving recipes can be found on-line.

Remember, don't starve yourself beforehand. You will likely eat (feast) more if you're super-hungry. That means don't skip breakfast; do fill up with whole-grain crackers, fruit, and raw vegetables if hunger pangs strike before the big meal, and do drink plenty

When the time comes to sit down to your Thanksgiving meal, you will be ready to enjoy it without overdoing it

It's also the amount of weight I've lost since my gastric bypass surgery as I celebrate my one year anniversary this week. Going by my roommate's habit of saving my cat's fur, I can't help but think that somewhere in my apartment he's actually managed to save all the fat I've lost and that's he's systematically building a new man out of it. I fully expect to come home one day and find a 6'1", perfectly proportioned man made entirely of human lard on the of my apartment building surrounded by aerobics instructors armed with torches, pitchforks and, most likely, various types of nautilus equipment. "Feel the burn!" they'll scream a my roommate's bankes greating as it auties et the air. hapless creation as it swipes at the air

frantically screaming "Grar! Exercise BAD!"

Being my own fat it would most likely

share most of my attitudes.

A year ago I had a large dinner party that, to my friends' horror, I called My Last Supper. It was supposed to mark the end of one life

and the beginning of another. To send me off, my friends all brought the most decadent, sinful dishes that I would never eat again - steaks as thick as your torso, pastas in rich cream sauces, sugary desserts, twice baked potatoes stuffed with cheese and sin. By the end of that meal everyone was seriously considering getting the surgery. Later this month to mark the end of the "honeymoon" period I'll be having a Don's First Supper night. The honeymoon period is what people call the 1 year after gastric bypass, when it's easiest to lose weight, when your willpower is at its strongest, and when you get the best results. As the honeymoon ends, you have to work harder to make the right choices and hope that all the changes you've made in your habits over the past year will be enough.

But the day itself, the "surgiversary",

that was just for me to consider what had changed in my life. I began that day I do every morning: putting on my pants, one leg at a time. My size 44 waist pants, down from size 62 a year ago. This follows the underwear, of course. There's a separate ritual for the underwear. A year ago I was wearing 5X underwear. Today, I wear XL. This leads to a period of mediation each morning where I stare at my underwear, wondering if they look smaller than yesterday, thinking that I could never possibly fit into they look smaller than yesterday, thinking that again. Yet each morning they fit, blowing my mind all over again. I imagine it must be like someone with Alzheimer's who won the lottery getting to discover they're a multi-millionaire every day.

From that point on the changes are too many to keep track of. The tiny breakfast

The easy sound of your breathing as you walk in the world. The joy of life, the confidence in tomorrow.


The pride.

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

The Nov. 3 elections have come and gone and all the pundits both gay and non-gay have said their two cents worth so I might as well put in my three cents worth. After all what is a soliloquy for?

The election results were certainly mixed with two great wins one in Washington State where the voters by a narrow margin upheld the state's upgraded domestic partner's law and in Kalamazoo, MI., where the voters by a 3-2 vote upheld the city's anti-discrimination ordinance.

There were many LGBT people elected to various offices. The LGBT Victory Fund reports 49 of 79 of the candidates the VC endorsed won their election and 6 are in run off elections. One of the run offs is Huston mayoral candidate, Anise Parker who at this time looks as though she will be Houston's next mayor.

Others around the country to win include Charlie Pugh, the first open LGBT member of the Detroit City Council and as the vote leader will become president of the council, Steve Kornell, the first open LGBT member of the St. Petersburg, FL., City Council, Sandra Kurt, the first open LGBT member of the Akron, OH., City Council, Mark Kleinschmidt, mayor of Chapel Hill, N.C.

Perhaps the most notable win is the election of Stan Penfold, Executive Director of the Utah AIDS Foundation, to the Salt Lake, UT, City Council marks the first time a LGBT person has held that position in the city the Mormons built. The Mormon hierarchy can not be pleased with the election of such a sinner to oversee the running of that city's business.

Wouldn't it be nice to have an open LGBT person on the Sacramento City Council?

Of course the big election disappointment was Maine where the voting majority overturned the same sex marriage law enacted by the state legislature and signed by the governor.

From my observation there is little to fault in the No on 1 campaign in Maine. It seems to have been well organized and straight forward showing LGBT people and their families in the TV ads. The ads started running early but the Yes on 1 people used the theme they used here in California for Prop 8 that the public education system was going to start telling kindergarten children all about queer birds and bees thus destining the little darlings to a life of accepting homosexuality as natural and normal.

The only thing I found disappointing in the No campaign was they used yard signs very similar to Prop 8 yard signs which were those horrible dark green with the yellow check mark. Yard signs should be bright signs like the yellow signs used by the pro-Prop 8 campaign. I haven't heard if the NO people in Maine were charging \$10 for a yard sign like the No on 8 did here. I have read reports of massive numbers the bright yellow Yes signs but too few No yard signs in cities all over Maine

The striking difference between Maine and Washington State seems to be the electorate is willing to grant all the privileges of marriage to LGBT people, just don't call it marriage.

I have never been too much in favor of



incremental way of doing things I generally believe we need to be bold and press for the whole enchilada but maybe with marriage we need to change our strategy. Just maybe we need to press for all marriages to be civil unions and the civil unions are done simply by signing a document at the office of the county recorder.

We need to refrain from having clergy of any faith acting as an agent of the state when it comes to marriage. After a couple signs in at the recorder's office if they choose to have some kind of religious blessing to their civil union they can go to the clergy of their choice for that blessing.

Maybe we need to start working on getting civil unions instituted in all states and then have those contracts be interchangeable among the states as marriage now is.

We have spent much too much time on the marriage issue. We have lost THIRTY ONE times (twice in California) same sex marriage has been put on the ballot. We say we are intelligent people. Losing 31 times should tell us we are not getting our message out and need to regroup instead of reinventing the wheel which always goes flat.

Sadly, for the most part, the only people interested in the marriage issue are the couples who are affected by what they can gain from being legally married. It is true some young people have been shocked to learn rights can be taken away by a vote or a court ruling and have gotten involved and seem to be gung ho to put a repeal of Prop 8 on the 2010 ballot which as I say would be a terrible mistake and at this time would only rack up number 32 for the religious bigots.

The marriage issue has simply overridden so many more issues that we need to be addressing for our community such as our youth and their suicide problem and the growing number of LGBT seniors who need low income housing and support systems so they are not forced back into the closet.

We need to put more pressure on the Democrats to quit being so cowardly and pass the Employment Non-discrimination Act,. This measure will affect a majority of LGBT in this country where such protection has not been afforded to them by their state government.

Don't Ask, Don't Tell is important but again only affects a small number of LGBT people.

So on a national level of priorities I would place ENDA number one and something that must pass before next spring, and repeal of DOMA and DADT on down the line.

Here in Sacramento we need to enhance support of our Community Center which with its new board seem to be on a path of enlarging center services and making it even more vital to our community, but at this present timed it along with the Lavender Library and Lambda Players are struggling for survival. Such community institutions are valuable assets which should not be lost. Since its founding in 1986 the Center has been support for thousands of Sacramento residents many of whom went there ashamed and confused about their sexual orientation and left the Center feeling comfortable about their orientation and proud of who they were.

The Lavender Library provides us with a sense of our history and culture. It provides us with thousands of books most of which are written by LGBT authors that tell our stories as only LGBT authors can.

The Lambda Players give us the best of live LGBT theater. As they have moved into their new digs at 21st & J they deserve our support for bringing us the plays which reflect the comedies and tragedies of our lives.

On Friday Nov. 6, it was good to see about 90 people attend a fund-raiser for the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, the oldest of our national institutions working to obtain our civil rights.

My friend Hans Johnson, newly elected Vice Co-Chair of the Task Force and new Sacramento resident Mario Guerrero and Task Force board member were co-hosts along with a number of locals of a lovely party which honored California State Controller John Chiang, Assembly Member John A. Perez and Kathy Kneer, Executive Director of Planned Parenthood Affiliates and clinics of California

Controller Chiang has been a long time supporter of our LGBT community and expressed his deep feelings about discrimination.

Assembly Member Perez is the first openly LGBT person of color to be elected to

the California Legislature and has more many years been a force in Los Angles working for LGBT rights.

Kathy Kneer has been a LGBT ally. She has lobbied the legislature for almost every piece of LGBT friendly legislation for over 15 years. She has been the principle force in the state defending woman's health issues and right of choice. She has successfully led the fight to defeat the parental notification initiatives which have appeared three times on the ballot and she will be the leader to defeat the one the RRR hopes to put on the ballot in 2010 or 2012. She also warrens there will be an attempt to put on the ballot a measure which will define when life begins. Such a measure was placed on the ballot in Colorado last year and it was defeated.

This was a wonderful event and I hope we will see more of the Task Force's presence here in Sacramento in the future.


Colorado Springs, CO: James Dobson has announced he will step down from his Focus on the Family broadcast at the end of February, 2010. Dobson is 73 years old and has been doing the broadcast for 32 years. At this point in time no successor as the host of the program has been announced.

Many of those who observe the RRR
as a movement feel this will give Dobson
more time to travel and personally engage in
political activities on behalf of what he calls
"the right" candidates for office.

Colorado Springs, CO: The Gazette reports, "As of Sept. 30, Focus had donated \$98,500 to Stand for Marriage Maine, a coalition supporting an initiative on the Nov. 3 ballot to overturn the state Legislature's legalization of gay marriage. Efforts began in May to collect signatures to get the measure on the ballot ... The leading donor to Stand for Marriage Maine is the Roman Catholic Diocese of Portland, Maine, which has given nearly \$390,000, Maine records show. Nonprofits like Focus and the Roman Catholic diocese are legally able to donate up to 15 percent of their annual budget to lobbying efforts."

Mixed Martial Arts: Dana White, president of the Ultimate Fighting Championship (UFC) commenting on the fact the organization



has openly gay fighters, "I honestly think it would have no impact whatsoever with not only our fighters or our fan base. The guys in the UFC, everybody is so cool, it's great sportsmanship, everybody has respect for each other. I honestly, it wouldn't be a big deal to me and most of the guys I know in this sport, it wouldn't be a big deal for them either."

He also acknowledged the sport has a large fan base of gay men.

Hampton Roads, VA: October 21, 2009
- The Navy is reprimanding and forcing the retirement of a chief petty officer who oversaw and perpetrated a string of abuses against a gay sailor and others in a military working dog unit in Bahrain, the Virginian Pilot is reporting today. After an investigation begun by Youth Radio prompted by an inquiry from Congress man Joe Sestak, the Navy conducted a review of complaints that Chief Petty Officer Michael Toussaint had harassed and abused Petty Officer 3rd Class Joseph Rocha and others, in part because of their sexual orientation. The incidents included forced simulation of homosexual acts, being fed dog food, and being hog-tied to a chair and rolled into a dog kennel full of feces.

As a result of the investigation, the Secretary of the Navy is issuing a letter of censure faulting Toussaint's actions. "The Navy's actions in reviewing Joseph Rocha's case show how important accountability is in the chain of command," said Dr. Aaron Belkin, director of the Palm Center at University of California, Santa Barbara. "The suffering of Rocha and others was exacerbated by the 'don't ask, don't tell' policy since it hampers the ability of abuse victims to hold leaders and perpetrators accountable. The results undermine discipline and order in the entire unit, not just for gays and lesbians."

The earlier investigation and Toussaint's subsequent promotion came to light this summer. Petty Officer 3rd Class Joseph Rocha, one of the sailors subjected to the abuse, later left the Navy after suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder related to the hazing. Rocha said he was often singled out for being gay after refusing to hire prostitutes. He eventually acknowledged being gay and left the Navy. He is now using his story to advocate for the repeal of the so-called Don't Ask, Don't Tell policy that prohibits openly gay men and women from serving in the military.

Minnesota: President Obama has nominated Minneapolis assistant chief of police and open lesbian, Sharon Lubinski, as Chief U.S. Marshall for Minnesota. She will be the first LGBT person to be appointed as a chief marshal. This appointment requires the advice and consent of the U.S. Senate.

Sweden: The Synod of the Lutheran Church of Sweden has voted 176 to 73 to allow same sex couples to be married in the church. The ruling by the Synod, which has 251 delegates, puts Sweden among the first countries in the world to allow gays to marry in a major church. Individual ministers will still be free to not perform SSM ceremonies.

LA Times: October 23, carries a story of Evangelical pastors and churches through out Africa accusing young children of being witches and warlocks. These charges cause mental and physical abuse which sometimes

leads to the child's death.

"The idea of witchcraft is hardly new, but it has taken on new life recently partly because of a rapid growth in evangelical Christianity. Campaigners against the practice say around 15,000 children have been accused in two of Nigeria's 36 states over the past decade and around 1,000 have been murdered. In the past month alone, three Nigerian children accused of witchcraft were killed and another three were set on fire . . . Nigeria is one of the heartlands of abuse, but hardly the only one: the United Nations Children's Fund says tens of thousands of children have been targeted throughout Africa."

Kampala, Uganda: The infamous
proposed Anti-Homosexuality Act has been
tabled until January, 2010. In some cases the
death penalty would be applied for some acts
of homosexuality and heavy prison sentences
for others.

Toronto, Canada: Irina Fedotova and Irina Shipitko well known LGBT activists in Moscow were married in Toronto on October 23 by openly gay family court judge, Harvey Brownstone, and congratulated by Toronto Mayor David Miller. They were accompanied by attorney and LGBT activist Nicolai Alesseev. The women intend to return to Russia and have their Canadian marriage recognized by the Russian government something the government refused to do last May when they applied for a marriage license in Moscow.

Henderson, Nevada: The Las Vegas Review-Journal reports a pair of parents of Green Valley High School have gone to court to prohibit the drama department form present "Rent" and The Laramie Project" citing their objections to the plays and the "adult content" of both plays "their own kids are essentially excluded from participation in the school's theater program."

Cory Hilton, attorney for the parents, admits he has not read the scripts which are a "toned down" versions of the plays.

Izmir, Turkey: the Governor of the City of Izmir is demanding the closure of the Black Pink Triangle Association because it is "against the law and morality." Attempts have been made to shut down three other LGBT organizations, KAOS-GL (2005), Pembe Hayat (Pink Life, 2006) and Lambda Istanbul (2008).

In January 2009, the 7th Judicial Office of the Supreme Court of Appeals has overturned the ruling of Istanbul's 3rd Civil Court of First Instance, which had decided to close down the Lambda Istanbul Association for a "violation of general morals.

Michigan: The Corunna Board of Education ordered a display by the Corunna High School Diversity Club for Gay History Month featuring nine photos of LGBT athletes, politicians and educators to be taken down. After being contacted by the ACLU the school board rescinded the order.

Holland: Hope College affiliated with the Reformed Church of America has barred Dustin Lance Black, Oscar winning writer of the film "Milk," has been barred from participating in a roundtable discussion about gay rights because school officials say he



is "an advocate." He was to speak after a showing of "Milk." School officials felt such a discussion could hurt students on both sides of the issues so as to make them feel "hurt and marginalized." He will be allowed to speak in a film making class.

Lancaster, CA: Joseph David Ramon

Lancaster, CA: Joseph David Ramon Moreaux, a clerk at the Family Christian Bookstore, has been charged with installing a video camera in the store's unisex bathroom where he could observe patrons using the facility

Chicago, ILL: Laura Rickets, 42, a Lambda Legal board member, and her family have bought the Chicago Cubs for a reported \$ 845 million. Ms. Ricketts has been out to her family for many years, lives with her partner and is the first known open LGBT person to own a major sports team. She will serve on the board of the Cubs along with her three brothers Pete, Todd and Tom who will serve as chair of the board.

Durham, N.C.: The Raleigh News &
Observer reports a study at Duke University
has upset Father Joe Vetter, the director
of the Duke Catholic Center, because he
believes the study which asks young women
over 18 to attend a one hour house party, fill
out a questionnaire about sexual attitudes
and practices, be given a gift bag and an
opportunity to purchase sex toys at reduced
rates promotes "promiscuity." The research
is being done to see if the use of sex toys will
reduce so-called promiscuity.



Orphan that I rented from a Red Box machine. Remember to live life to the fullest every day, because you never know when your time might come — and always make your haters your


